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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

PaleoWest conducted a historic buildings survey on behalf of the City of Montgomery to document buildings in three neighborhoods that were important places in the Civil Rights Movement. The project was undertaken to fulfill the City of Montgomery's National Park Service grant P18AP00114. The project was partially funded by the African American Civil Rights program of the Historic Preservation Fund, National Park Service, Department of the Interior. Any opinions, findings, and conclusions or recommendations expressed in this material do not necessarily reflect the views of the Department of the Interior.

The survey encompassed approximately 947.8 acres in Montgomery, Alabama. The project is located in Township 16 North Range 17 East, Township 16 North Range 18 East on the Montgomery North and Montgomery S topographic quadrangle.

The purpose of PaleoWest's survey was to complete an architectural survey of historic African American resources, research, and documentation. Work was conducted in the neighborhoods of Centennial Hill, King Hill, and West Montgomery and assessed the significance of properties with respect to the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) criteria in 36 CFR 60, *National Historic Preservation Act* of 1966, as amended. The survey was completed in accordance with federal and state regulations and undertaken to comply with the Alabama Historical Commission's Architectural Survey Guidelines.

As a result of the historic buildings survey, PaleoWest documented 2,255 extant buildings and 100 demolished buildings. Contextual research focused on the communities' history, organization, and participation in the Civil Rights Movement in Montgomery, Alabama, and the impact these collective actions had on national awareness and change of practices that discriminated against African Americans.

The surveyed buildings included eight previously listed in the Alabama Register of Landmarks and Heritage (ARLH) or the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP), 824 are newly recorded resources recommended for listing in the ARLH. Eight hundred and twenty-eight buildings are considered contributing resources for historic districts that preserve the built character of the Civil Rights era in Montgomery, Alabama.

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Survey Purpose and Methods

In 2018, the City of Montgomery was awarded an African American Civil Rights Grant administered by the National Park Service to recognize the Civil Rights Heritage of Montgomery, Alabama. The project purpose was to record the historical context and significant neighborhoods of residents of Montgomery who organized, supported, and participated in the Montgomery Bus Boycott from December 1955 to December 1956. Work included archival research into local community history of African American neighborhoods in the City of Montgomery and the documentation of extant historical buildings in these neighborhoods.

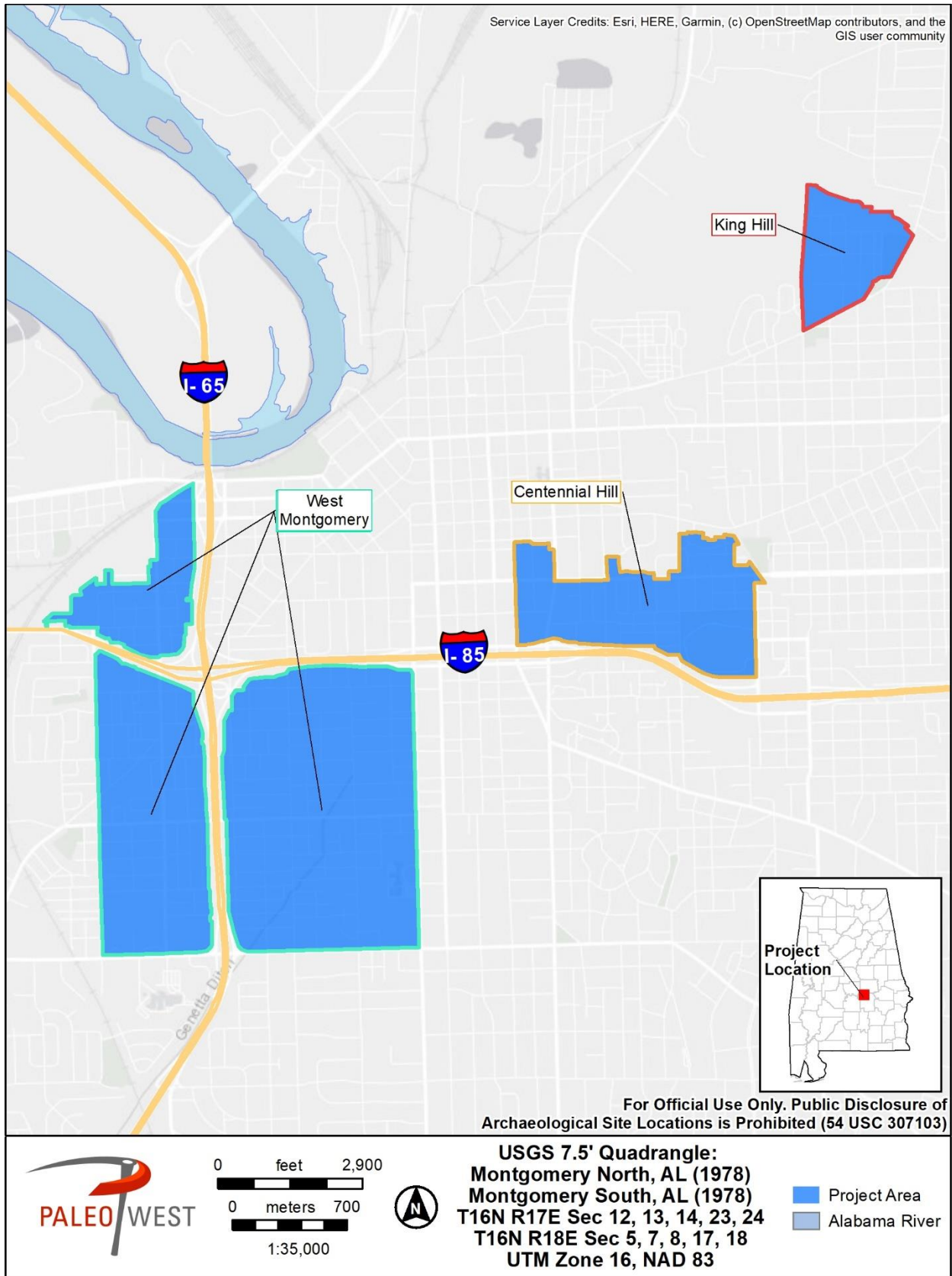


Figure 1. Neighborhoods of the general project area.

Documentation of historical buildings was completed in three neighborhoods (Figure 1). The neighborhoods surveyed include:

- *Centennial Hill*, today bounded by Hutchinson Street, South Decatur Street, Alabama Street, Key Street, and new development north of Highland Avenue.
- *King Hill*, today north of Upper Wetumpka Road between the King Hill Community Park and Capital Parkway Court.
- *West Montgomery*, today bounded by South Court Street, West Fairview Avenue, Hill Street, the Louisville and Nashville Railroad, I-65, and I-85.

In cooperation with the City of Montgomery Planning Department, digital Historic Building Survey forms were prepared for every building in the survey areas identified as built prior to 1970 by the Montgomery County property appraiser records (Revenue Commissioner of Montgomery County 2020). Additionally, buildings on the Alabama Register of Landmarks and Heritage in the project area and in adjacent neighborhoods were visited and updated Historic Building Survey forms completed. The PaleoWest field team completed pedestrian survey between June 3, 2019, and July 10, 2019. Buildings were photographed from the public right-of-way, and forms were completed in-field by team members while observing the building.

Background work included archival research at Alabama State University and the Alabama Department of History and Archives. Previous work conducted by the City of Montgomery was consulted, including a historic buildings survey of the Peacock Tract area (Anderson 2011), the Rosa Parks Combined Communities and Five Points Neighborhood Plan (City of Montgomery 2008b), and the Centennial Hill Neighborhood Plan (2008a).

Documentation followed the Alabama Historical Commission (AHC) Architectural Survey and Historic Building Survey Form Guidelines. Photographs and notes were taken for each building. When possible, multiple photos were taken of each building, focusing on distinguishing architectural elements and integrity. Structures were evaluated individually and considered for contribution to a potential historic district that represented the built African American community of Montgomery during the Civil Rights era. Individual evaluation considered if the building is significant for its association with historic events (Criterion A); if it is significant because of its association with an individual (Criterion B); if it is significant for architectural, landscape, aesthetic, or other physical qualities (Criterion C); and if it has yielded or may be likely to yield information important for history (Criterion D).

A successful project of this scale is always at its best when it has a great team behind it. The Montgomery Planning Department, including Georgette Norman, Nita Wilson, Kitty Chamberlain, Robert Smith, Lynda Wool, Ashley Hinson, Richard Bailey, and Christy Anderson, who had the vision to commence this project and then shared their knowledge and love of community with all who participated in project work. The PaleoWest field team led by Sunshine Thomas included K'Vaughan Dildy, Clayton Barnes, Caroline Steffy, and Elizabeth Morris. Community and historical research were completed by Benjamin DiBiase with assistance from archives staff. In particular, we extend our thanks to Howard Robinson and Jason Trawick at Alabama State University, Meredith McDonough at the Alabama Department of Archives and History, and all of the reference archivists at the Alabama Department of History and Archives. Historical information pertaining to individual structures benefited enormously from the efforts of Georgette Norman and the kindness of current residents who generously shared their family and community history with the field team.

Survey Results

The survey focused on the historical Centennial Hill, West Montgomery, and King Hill neighborhoods of Montgomery, Alabama. The Centennial Hill neighborhood is bounded by Hutchinson Street, South Decatur Street, Alabama Street, Key Street, and new development north of Highland Avenue. The West Montgomery neighborhood is bounded by West Fairview Avenue, Hill Street, the CSX Transportation Railroad, the I-65/I-85 interchange, I-85, and South Court Street. The King Hill neighborhood is bounded by Upper Wetumpka Road between the King Hill Community Park and Capital Parkway Court.

In total, approximately 947.8 acres were surveyed resulting in the documentation of 2,255 buildings. The aim was to document every building in the community built prior to 1970. Prior to fieldwork, an effort was made to eliminate additional addresses that pertained to duplicate structures in county property records, duplexes being a common example. In practice, the historical built environment is often adapted through the years for the needs of residents, and multiple addresses for the same structure were sometimes noted only after buildings were visited in the field. One hundred and twenty buildings were noted in the field

as having multiple addresses. Only one Historic Building Survey form was completed for these. Additionally, 100 structures were demolished between the last Montgomery County property records update and the field visit. Occasionally, a second un-addressed residence was observed. Buildings with County property appraiser records listing year built as "0" were not recorded (Revenue Commissioner of Montgomery County 2020). An Historic Building Survey form was completed for these. Surveyor access was limited to the public right-of-way in communities, and only one instance occurred in which a building could not be recorded because of access limitations.

Of the buildings recorded, 54 are currently used by religious organizations, 93 are currently used by businesses, and 1,874 are currently used as residences. Current education buildings were generally not included in the survey. However, the Dexter Avenue King Parsonage, which that is now used as an educational historic building, and the school on the St. Jude campus, were included. Six buildings were recorded as currently being used for community/social purposes.

The Historic Building Survey presented here is only one element of recognizing the community and historic importance of the collective actions of African Americans in Montgomery during the Civil Rights Movement. Future work should be undertaken to share the data collected here with the general public and with the community that lives in these neighborhoods today. One method to reach a wide audience is through the distribution of print media. Production of trifold brochures are attractive and accessible by most individuals. Another method is production of a web-based presentation of data. This format can be both dynamic in presentation and also expandable as more research is conducted within the communities. These communities of Montgomery have many important stories to share. More focused efforts going forward will highlight the stories, individuals, and buildings with interconnected histories. In the future, these can be recognized for their contributions to Alabama and United States history.

Environmental Context

The neighborhoods surveyed are located adjacent to downtown Montgomery. Much of the city, the survey area included, is within the Blackland Prairie ecoregion of the Southeastern Plains (Griffith et al. 2001). The area is characterized by Cretaceous age, generally clay soils. These are typically the well-drained Ruston series Ultisol with relatively shallow B horizons at approximately 18 centimeters below surface (Soil Survey Staff 2020). In the survey area, many localized areas have likely been altered by urban processes. In the past, this area supported mixed hardwoods such as sweetgum, post oak, and red cedar interspersed with bluestem prairie. Today, much of the wider area is cleared for agricultural purposes. Larger vegetation in the survey area today still includes these species with the addition of pecans and non-local cedars introduced by the historical community.

The City of Montgomery is built on the Alabama River. Portions of the surveyed area north of I-85 are less than a mile from the river. Other waters within the communities surveyed included historically named Cypress Swamp northeast of the city that drained into the Alabama River. The swamp and the waterway are unnamed today. These waters were adjacent and likely important to early residents of the King Hill neighborhood. Another waterway today known as Grenetta Ditch flows northeast to southwest through the West Montgomery neighborhood, draining into Catoma Creek. Today, some of this waterway is channeled through underground storm drains.

Character of the Built Environment

The developed character of the survey area today reflects the historical building trends of the past. The oldest homes are located in Centennial Hill and include those in a two-pen, vernacular Victorian style. Later styles also are represented in this area. West Montgomery, the largest surveyed area, includes a mixture of styles but is dominated by the Craftsman homes built in the neighborhood broadly between the 1920s and 1950s. Two-room shotgun-style homes with bathroom additions and duplexes are economical home types in both the Centennial Hill and West Montgomery neighborhoods. Their styles vary and include vernacular, Victorian, and Craftsman homes. The King Hill neighborhood buildings are almost entirely of twentieth-century construction and typically reflect minimalist traditional type construction elements or early mid-century ranch-style elements.

The surveyed area today, as in the past, is predominantly residential. Although vacant community store buildings suggest neighborhood-level commerce was more common in the past. The dominant method and material of construction for multiple building styles is wood framing (n=1,671) on brick piers. In most instances, open foundations have been enclosed with lattice wood or brick or concrete block walls to create the exterior appearance of a continuous foundation. In most cases, no structural support is provided by these enclosures. Most residences are single family, one-story homes, but 273 were recorded as duplexes or double-shotgun types. Examples of these two-family residences converted to single-family use were often noted during the survey, suggesting these economical homes were even more common in the neighborhood landscape than they are today.

The surveyed communities are not just a cultural construction of the families who have lived their lives in the neighborhoods of Montgomery, they are also the historical, physical construction of generations of African American craftsmen and architects. Prominent public buildings like Day Street Church are formal designs of architects. Most residential buildings were built by every-day contractors who built homes for their neighbors and for others across the city. While this is true of houses of all materials, it is particularly evident in the brick homes of Montgomery. Four hundred and sixty buildings surveyed have brick siding, and an additional 76 buildings have siding of brick and other materials. A few houses were even originally constructed with wood siding and altered historically to have brick siding. The

brickwork of these homes is the work of the city's African American brick masons, whose two-story Bricklayers Hall is one of the buildings included in this survey.

Building Types and Styles Recorded

Types and styles of buildings recorded during the survey reflect co-occurring cultural, familial, and economic elements during both their time of construction and at as homes were altered to suit the needs of residents at later dates. This is illustrated by the oldest house form remaining in the survey area, the late nineteenth-century two-room Victorian home (Figure 2). The two-room-wide home variably has been linked to upland south traditions of rural farmers (Meyer 1975), rural pioneer traditions of Florida (Haase 1992), or houses in the southeast used by enslaved individuals prior to the Civil War (Gordon 2002). The shared element of this house type is its use in rural settlement areas. The form served as an economical home often built with double front doors for flexible use. The building could be used as a single-family dwelling or as a one-room duplex, note the double front doors on the buildings in Figure 2. With growth in the family and economic means additions were frequently added. These same benefits likely made this house type a familiar and practical choice for the earliest residents of the neighborhoods surveyed. The building in the top row of Figure 2 is the only remaining example of this house type without additions in the survey area. Few of these house forms remain in the survey area, and most are present in the Centennial Hill neighborhood. These houses are often being demolished in the survey area.

Other house types and styles constructed in the survey area include larger central-hallway late-Victorian styles (Figure 3, top left). These homes typically feature a front decorative gable, often with decorative shingle siding, and were built around 1900. They are often altered today with porch remodels and enclosures ranging from screened-in portions to full enclosure for added interior space. L-shaped gabled homes in a folk Victorian style were also present in the neighborhood, but most of these in the survey area have received extensive remodeling and room additions that mask their original plan and style.

Shotgun homes and double shotgun homes are types built from around 1900 through to the mid-century (Figure 3, bottom). Two hundred and seventy-three were recorded during the survey. The styles and materials of these homes change over time. Nineteenth century and very early twentieth century examples reflect the Victorian aesthetic, later twentieth-century examples are often in a Craftsman-style, and shotgun houses closer to the mid-twentieth century are often simple in style and frequently constructed of concrete block. Shotgun homes today typically have a bathroom addition in the rear of the house.

Craftsman houses were most popular homes during the first half of the twentieth century (Figure 4, left). Exposed rafter ends, decorative knee braces, and porches with front gables, and

ventilation louvers are common elements of these homes. The most common alteration to their front façade is screened-in or full enclosure of the front porch. Other styles from this broad time period are present but are less common in the neighborhoods including sand-hill cottages, Tudor homes, shingle, and eclectic styles.

In the mid-twentieth century, most of the built environment of the three surveyed neighborhoods was present. Construction of new homes did still occur, and the style of these homes are often typical of their construction period. The late 1930s–1950s saw the introduction of the Minimalist Traditional type (HPD 2008), a budget alternative to the shotgun home that utilized increasingly standardized building materials of the post-World War era (Figure 4, right). Also built mid-twentieth century were Ranch homes and smaller homes in a Ranch-style (Figure 5). Examples within the survey area typically were constructed so the narrow façade faced the public street. It seems likely this was done so the house could be placed on the historically narrow lots. The characteristic front living rooms and the accompanying front picture windows of these Ranch homes were shifted to the front façade of the home.

The buildings surveyed and the lots on which they were they are built are almost always oriented north-south and east-west. This pattern is a product of the street design and layout of the surveyed area, and it is typical of many neighborhoods in Montgomery. The occasional exception to this was encountered along Grenetta Ditch, where a few buildings were constructed parallel to the waterway. The other exception was along Mobile Road that atypically runs northeast-southwest. A few, but not all, homes along this roadway oriented parallel to the street.

Buildings throughout the neighborhoods have been subject to additions, remodels, and alterations. Homes have changed as the needs of residents change, the financial means of owners have changed, or due to general maintenance needs. Frequent larger alterations include the addition of rooms and the enclosure of spaces that were originally constructed

as porches. Some larger homes originally built to house a single family have been converted to multi-family dwellings. More frequently, buildings originally constructed as duplexes or adjacent shotguns have been converted to dwellings for single families. Routine maintenance needs of historic structures or waning popularity of architectural styles have frequently prompted changes, such as the reconstruction of front porches; changes in decorative details like porch post styles, moldings, and paint colors; and replacement of original windows (Figure 6). Many alterations recorded were made before the Civil Rights Movement in Montgomery, because most of the buildings surveyed were built prior to this time. When evaluating each building's contribution to a historic district characteristic of the Civil Rights era, recommendations were made based on the building's pre-1970 appearance.

Significance of Surveyed Area

This survey includes three non-contiguous historic African American neighborhoods in Montgomery, Alabama—Centennial Hill, West Montgomery, and King Hill. Each neighborhood can trace its origins to the nineteenth century, and residents within each

neighborhood played a key role in the Modern Civil Rights Movement of the mid-twentieth century, specifically the 1955–56 Montgomery Bus Boycott and the 1965 Voting Rights March from Selma to Montgomery. Both events deeply involved the residents of the three surveyed neighborhoods, as Montgomery became the “Birthplace of the Modern Civil Rights Movement” within the “Cradle of the Confederacy,” phrases that appear together on the city’s current official seal. The latter motto was added in 1952 by an all-white city council in direct response to the beginnings of the Modern Civil Rights Movement in that city. In 2002, the first motto was added to reflect Montgomery’s role in that nation-wide movement (Gettleman 2002).

Many of the homes in the survey area represent the history of an often-marginalized portion of Montgomery’s population, the working-class African Americans and their families. Throughout the last century, many of the individuals who lived in the surveyed areas contributed to several national efforts aimed at securing basic civil rights for African Americans around the country. The tangible evidence of the struggle for African American Montgomeriesians exists in the homes and businesses within the surveyed neighborhoods. A rich history of community-based entrepreneurship, as well as civic and religious history, is carried in the buildings that exist within the surveyed areas.

Early Montgomery History

The area that would later become Montgomery was an important crossroads of early indigenous trade routes. By the 16th century, Spanish explorers such as Hernando de Soto had ventured into the central Alabama region, and a slow migration of white traders and settlers began moving into the region towards the end of the eighteenth century. They encountered a large population of Muscogee-speaking people known loosely as the Creeks. The Creek Indians of central Alabama were connected to a wider network of trading partners via routes along and across the Alabama River. The first recorded permanent settler was Scottish trader James McQueen, who traded around Montgomery in 1716, although the area was still part of a much larger Mississippi Territory. The Creeks continued trade with European settlers such as McQueen over the course of the eighteenth century, but after the end of the Revolutionary War, they’d ceded large tracts of land to the newly formed American government. Hostilities between white settlers and the Creek tribes arose and led to a series of wars and treaties into the eighteenth century. All of these factors led to a fracturing of the Creek Nation, and ultimately to a civil war. The Creek Civil War (1813–1814), known as the Red Stick War, ended much of the fur trading that occurred in the area prior to 1814. The eastern half of the Mississippi Territory was partitioned off and became the Alabama territory in 1817, which led to land sales and an increase in white settlers. The American approach to the Creek populations in Alabama and the greater southeast was one of colonial conquest. For Alabama’s early white settlers, the Creeks represented an impediment to land acquisition, land that would ultimately make some in Montgomery County wealthy (Grenier 2012). The Creeks were compelled to cede millions of acres to the Americans after the war as a result of the increased pressure over land use rights, and the breakup of Creek clans

that had fought on either side of the war. As U.S. settlers continued to move into the region, cotton production replaced the fur trade as the major driver of Alabama's early economy and drove Montgomery's rapid development over the course of the next few decades.

Montgomery's location on the Alabama River made it an ideal site for farming in the region as early as the eighteenth century (Neeley 2019). Montgomery County was created by the territorial legislature in 1816, and land sales began in earnest. The City of Montgomery was formed in 1818 from the combination of two early settlements—New Philadelphia and Alabama Town. The former was established by Andrew Dexter and encompassed the eastern half of what is now the downtown Montgomery area. Dexter was an early entrepreneur and envisioned the town one day becoming the capital and an important economic center for Alabama. He set aside a small piece of prime land atop a small hill known as Goat Hill for the future site of the capitol building. A group of investors led by John Scott established Alabama Town approximately three miles downriver from present-day downtown Montgomery. In response to New Philadelphia's initial success in attracting settlers, Scott and his group moved their settlement upriver adjacent to New Philadelphia and named it East Alabama Town in 1819. It became clear that it would benefit all parties if the towns were merged and incorporated, which occurred on December 3, 1819. Vestiges of the two original towns remain: streets to the east of present-day Court Street are aligned on a north-south and east-west plan, while streets to the west of Court Street are perpendicular to the Alabama River. Alabama was admitted into the Union only days after Montgomery's incorporation, illustrating the rapid rate at which the cotton economy and potential for profit enabled Alabama's development during this time period. Montgomery's location on the eastern bank of a bend in the Alabama River contributed to a period of rapid population and economic growth in the early nineteenth century and attracted settlers who focused on cotton as the primary cash crop.

By 1822, the first steamboat safely made the trip from Mobile up the Alabama River to Montgomery (ADHA 2019). In an age before railroads became commercially viable, the arrival of the steamboat meant that Alabama's interior residents could compete with trading competitors in cities like Mobile on the Gulf Coast. Montgomery's location in the middle of Alabama's cotton belt, and the establishment of riverine trade networks in the Gulf of Mexico, enabled the city to flourish in the first decades after establishment. An 1878 City Directory stated that, "Its geographical location for trade is not exceeded by any interior city of the State," and that, "Within a mile of the corporate limits begin the rich prairie lands on the south and southeast, which are continuous for twenty-six miles" (Blue 1878). On January 21, 1846, Montgomery was selected as the state capital, although the first legislative session was not held until December 1847 (ADHA 2019). Although early Montgomery founder Andrew Dexter originally set aside Goat Hill in 1819 for private use, the land was not improved and was instead given to the state for use as a capital ground. The first capitol building opened in 1847 but was destroyed by a fire in 1849. A new building was constructed in its ashes, which still stands today. By the early 1850s, Montgomery was connected to the rest of the country by major rail networks, and the rest of that decade was marked by steady

progress and growth. Much of that growth was shouldered by the enslaved people working on Montgomery's surrounding cotton plantations. By 1860, the issue of secession to protect that slave system compelled the state government to vote in favor of leaving the Union, which was officially ratified on January 7, 1861. Although fighting during the Civil War did not reach Montgomery in any serious manner, the effects of the war, and the eventual emancipation of the state's enslaved population had a tremendous impact on all Montgomerians (Neeley 2019).

Enslavement in Montgomery and Southern Alabama

It is impossible to discuss the African American neighborhoods of Montgomery in the twentieth century without first discussing the forces that created a segregated city in the nineteenth century during the years following Reconstruction. The system of enslaved African labor quite literally built the city from its founding in 1818 to the end of the Civil War. Montgomery's location in the center of the "cotton belt," or the "black belt" for its rich, dark soil, meant that the city became the economic center for not only Alabama's development, but also for the development of the broader American South. By the early nineteenth century, the American system of enslaved labor was honed into a brutal practice of chattel bondage and dehumanizing working and living conditions. The rail line connecting Montgomery with Atlanta, Georgia, was cleared and built by enslaved people, and substantially hastened the movement of other enslaved individuals throughout the South. During this time, enslaved people in Alabama had little to no prospect of freedom or hope for an end to their plight. Enslavement became the method for agricultural production, and by 1820, shortly after Alabama gained statehood, roughly 40 percent, or 40,000 of more than 125,000 individuals living in the state, were in bondage. By the time of Alabama's secession from the Union in 1860 that figure had risen to roughly 45 percent of the total population, or nearly 436,000 individuals. A large proportion of people entering the U.S. through the Transatlantic Slave Trade found themselves in or near the Blackland Prairie ecoregion, located largely within the southern section of the newly created state of Alabama and parts of the states of Georgia and Mississippi to its east and west, respectively. Montgomery's location on the Alabama River, and ample, nearby cotton-growing farmland, meant that human enslavement became a large part of the city's identity in the years leading up to the Civil War (EJI 2018). With the improvement of rail lines, the economic center of the South moved away from the Gulf and into the interior. Montgomery surpassed New Orleans as a slave-trading capital. Enslaved individuals arriving in Montgomery by steamboat were marched directly up present-day Commerce Street, while those coming on foot from the northern parts of the state came down the Old Federal Road. The slave market was centered near present-day Court Square, downtown (EJI 2018). The dealers conducted business along Market Street (now Dexter Avenue), Commerce Street, and Court Square. The trade in Montgomery was so prosperous in the early 1860s that the number of slave trade-related businesses outnumbered churches and hotels (EJI 2018).

The myriad circumstances leading to the nineteenth-century human trade and plantation complex in the southeastern U.S., meant that emancipation also followed a complex and uneven path (Curtin 1998). This is no more evident than in the decades immediately following the end of the Civil War. It was during these years that Montgomery's first free African American communities began to develop, as people moved from rural plantations and farms on the outer edges of Montgomery County toward the city itself. Many clustered around Freedmen's Bureau outposts. Emancipation presented a host of challenges for Alabama's newly freed population. Many were illiterate, and they had little or no interaction with banks, the legal system, or many other social networks essential to individual advancement. Federal intervention by means of the Freedmen's Bureau became one of the only viable means for former bondsmen and women to gain employment, educational opportunities, and exercise their constitutionally protected rights.

Reconstruction and Post-Reconstruction in Montgomery

The Bureau of Refugees, Freedmen and Abandoned Lands, later known simply as the Freedmen's Bureau, was a federal program set up in 1865 to integrate emancipated laborers into free society and establish a new social order in the South. Most bondsmen and women were barred from learning to read or write, and they had little or no experience with political, financial, and other government institutions. The Commissioner of the Bureau was authorized to appoint Assistant Commissioners throughout the South to help administer the Bureau's duties. In Alabama, field offices overseen by an assistant commissioner were established in Montgomery, Tuscaloosa, Huntsville, Mobile, Opelika, Selma, and several other towns and cities over the course of the agency's existence in the state. It was from these offices, including the one in Montgomery, that provided the primary means of protection and opportunity for newly emancipated laborers. Their work included overseeing employment contracts between plantation owners and former enslaved persons, recording acts of violence, administering aid and rations, and working with non-governmental organizations in establishing schools. The Freedmen's Bureau's work was not limited to former emancipated individuals, but also extended to white Alabamians left destitute after the war (US NARA 2002).

Federal Reconstruction in Alabama officially lasted from 1865 to 1874. During this time, those who could escape the violence and navigate the myriad of social, financial, and political obstacles found success in Montgomery society shortly after emancipation. Those who had worked as skilled craftsmen during enslavement, were now employing their skills for compensation.

Shortly after Emancipation, violence against the freedmen became endemic throughout Montgomery. Fear, vindictiveness, and hatred for the free population of African American Alabamians led to countless murders and attempts to keep formerly enslaved people working on plantations without adequate pay. In August of 1865, as more African Americans moved into Montgomery, doctors reported treating almost 20 African American residents

for wounds inflicted by white residents resisting their migration (EJI 2018:60). Further complicating the freedmen's situations was the severe lack of funds and resources allocated to the Freedmen's Bureau to combat this violence, which ultimately led to a steady backsliding into restricted civil rights for African Americans in Montgomery and the greater South (EJI 2018:23).

State and local government officials largely halted the efforts of the Bureau after the 1874 election, when a Democratically controlled legislature and governor worked to reverse many of the Reconstruction policies put in place to enfranchise and integrate the state's free population (Robinson 1999:57). The process of disenfranchisement in Montgomery was swift. In 1876, the city limits were re-drawn to exclude many African American neighborhoods, and a year later, almost all African American Montgomeries were deemed ineligible to vote, and all African American office holders were removed (EJI 2018:62). A popular tactic for stripping civil rights was the enactment of local and municipal ordinances mandating segregation. Many of these ordinances came in response to the U.S. Supreme Court's decision in *Plessey v. Ferguson*, which set the precedent for "separate but equal" interpretation of public access laws in 1896. Some of Montgomery's earliest segregation laws can be traced to this period. These types of laws were not unique to Alabama and made up a common code in southern states known as Jim Crow laws. These local and state laws, along with entrenched social norms of segregation, violence, and disenfranchisement, were quickly codified into state law in 1901 with the drafting a new state constitution.

Included in the new state constitution were laws criminalizing loitering and vagrancy, which were meant as subjective policing tools for government officials, aimed largely at the city's African American population (Figure 7). These measures gave law enforcement officials expanded authority to arrest someone for almost nothing, stating that it was "unlawful for any person to loaf, loiter or idle upon any street or public place in the City of Montgomery." This led to an increase in African Americans imprisoned and forced into the convict leasing system because the fine for a guilty conviction was \$500 and up to 12 months of hard labor (EJI 2018:63). These tactics contributed to the self-segregation of African Americans in Montgomery into the twentieth century. Less and less contact with white businesses and social institutions drove Montgomery's African American residents inward for support, further coalescing neighborhoods independent from much of the rest of Montgomery society.

According to the 1910 U.S. Federal Census, Montgomery's population was split almost evenly between white and black residents, with the African American residents of Montgomery outnumbering whites by just over 500 individuals. Although numerically even, economic opportunities for African Americans remained stalled.

The combination of disenfranchisement, violence or threat of violence, and expulsion from many aspects of white society led many in the African American community to turn inward for social, economic, and societal fulfillment. Clusters of segregated communities around the city formalized and solidified behind the idea of a unified and insular system that would operate outside of white society. It was during the waning years of the nineteenth century that Montgomery's African American neighborhoods developed their own identities and enabled their residents to survive the violence and racism now central to the city's identity.

Based on figures in the 1940 U.S. census, the city's population was still almost evenly split between residents categorized as black and white. Slightly more than 44 percent of Montgomery's roughly 78,000 residents were recorded as black and lived in one of four distinct neighborhoods ranging from Centennial Hill just blocks from the State Capitol, to southern West Montgomery near the city's growing suburbs. North Montgomery served the

majority of Montgomery's poorest African American residents. A large portion of the King Hill area of North Montgomery was rented, most often from white landlords, rather than owned by African American Montgomerians.

Between 1935 and 1940, the federal government created maps of the country's metropolitan areas for the Home Owner's Loan Corporation (HOLC), which was meant to encourage real estate investment via federally-backed bank loans. These maps graded a particular city's neighborhoods as being "Minimum risk" to "Hazardous" for investors and lenders. These redline maps, as they became known, not only considered structural or infrastructural components, but they also weighed an area's integrity on race and other anecdotal parameters. Montgomery's African American neighborhoods, including those documented as part of this survey, were almost entirely graded as being "hazardous" or "at risk" by the agents grading these surveys and creating the maps (

Figure 8). The HOLC's ratings placed 83 percent of the entire population of Montgomery in zones marked as either "hazardous" or "definitely declining." All three largely African American neighborhoods documented for this survey were included in these zones. In a recent study and subsequent digital history project, historians found that the majority of agents working on behalf of the HOLC "assumed and insisted that the residency of African Americans and immigrants, as well as working-class whites compromised the value of homes and the security of mortgages" (Nelson et al. 2019). This economic marginalization directly impacted Montgomery's African American communities by adding another barrier restricting mortgage eligibility and devaluing existing homes. The work of the HOLC also succeeded in inhibiting meaningful economic growth in many of the neighborhoods surveyed, most notably in the King Hill neighborhood. It was a combination of federal and state marginalization and a development of homogeneous communities centered on African American-owned businesses and churches that led to Montgomery's evolution of fully segregated living conditions.

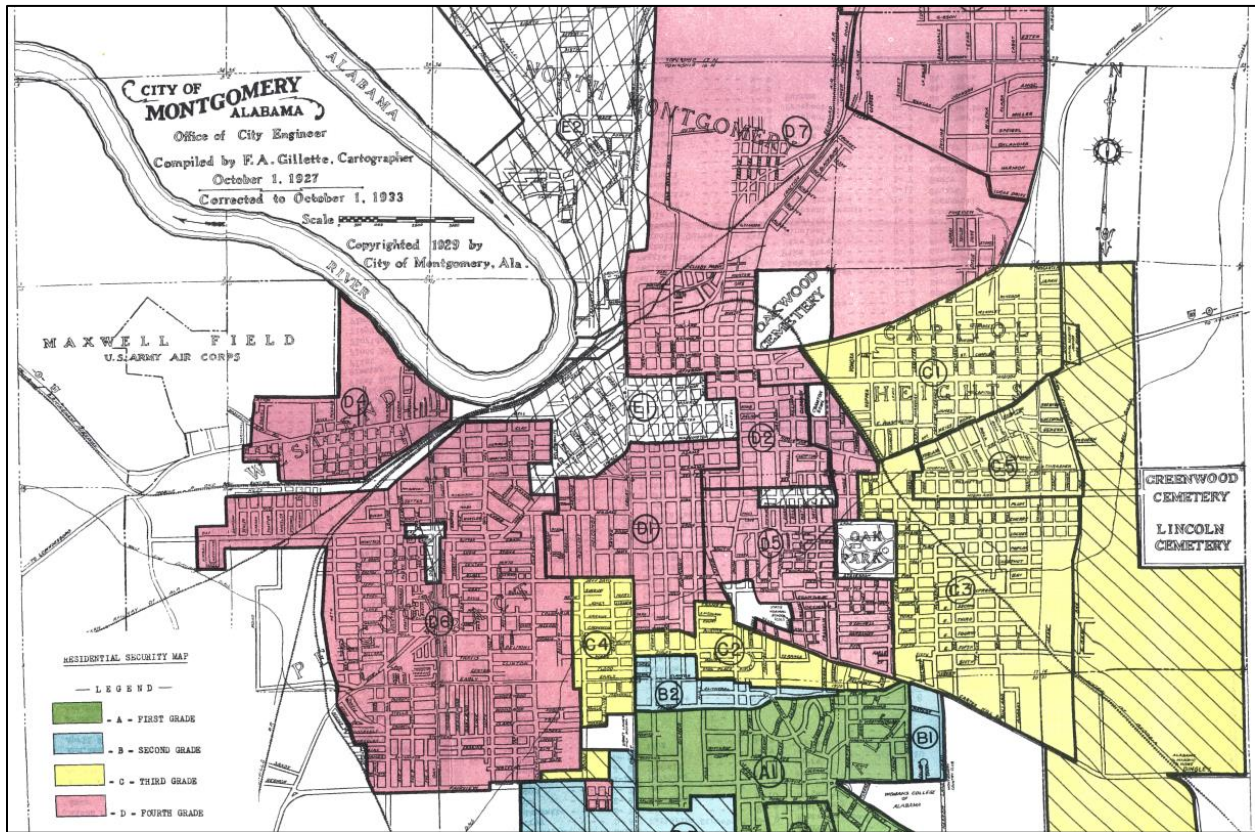


Figure 8. 1933 HOLC map of Montgomery (from Nelson et al. 2019).

The Establishment of African American Communities in Montgomery

A number of internal and external factors drove the development of distinct African American communities in and around Montgomery. One of these factors were the post-emancipation interactions and relationships between white and African American Montgomeries. The sudden and complete disenfranchisement and violence aimed at African Americans led to the development of partitioned neighborhoods and public spaces. Race relations in a deeply entrenched Jim Crow society fed economic hardships and forced African American communities to the outskirts of the city. Centennial Hill, West Montgomery, and King Hill (North Montgomery) coalesced into separate communities by the beginning of the twentieth century. After the end of Reconstruction, and the revision of Alabama's state constitution in 1901, Montgomery's African American residents turned inward and developed businesses, churches, schools, and other organizations of their own (Robinson 1999). Residents managed their own real estate, funerary practices, churches, and other institutions to enable their community to prosper and live in relative isolation within the context of the broader city.

Yet this need to develop independent facilities did not immediately create accessible spaces for Montgomery's African American population because external pressures continued to

drive cyclical disenfranchisement. In the 1941 edition of *The Negro Motorist's Green-Book*, an annual publication begun in 1936 to alert African Americans to areas of the country that were safe for travel, lists only two Montgomery establishments open to African American visitors—“Bonnie’s” at 390 West Jeff Davis Avenue and “Douglas Tavern” on 121 Monroe Street (Green 1941). The lack of advertised establishments catering to African American visitors in the city highlights the segregation and economic disenfranchisement that persisted for many residents.

Although the movement toward self-sufficient neighborhoods led to more African American-owned businesses and greater social mobility within the community, there were still tremendous obstacles to economic development. According to the 1950 U.S. census, there were more than 10,500 detached, single-owner-occupied homes within the city limits, of which, more than 7,000 were built before 1939 and most of which were valued at under \$2,000. Rental properties in Montgomery far exceeded owner-occupied dwellings, with nearly 19,500 rental units. Most of these dwellings were also built prior to 1950. These figures illustrate that neighborhood home construction was ongoing during the first half of the twentieth century. However, socioeconomic factors limited the capital available for residents to invest into owner-occupied housing. Efforts of the HOLC effectively blocked financial assistance for new construction or improvements within these neighborhoods. The origins of these African American communities in the nineteenth century were largely voluntary but also necessary. In the twentieth century, it became the norm.

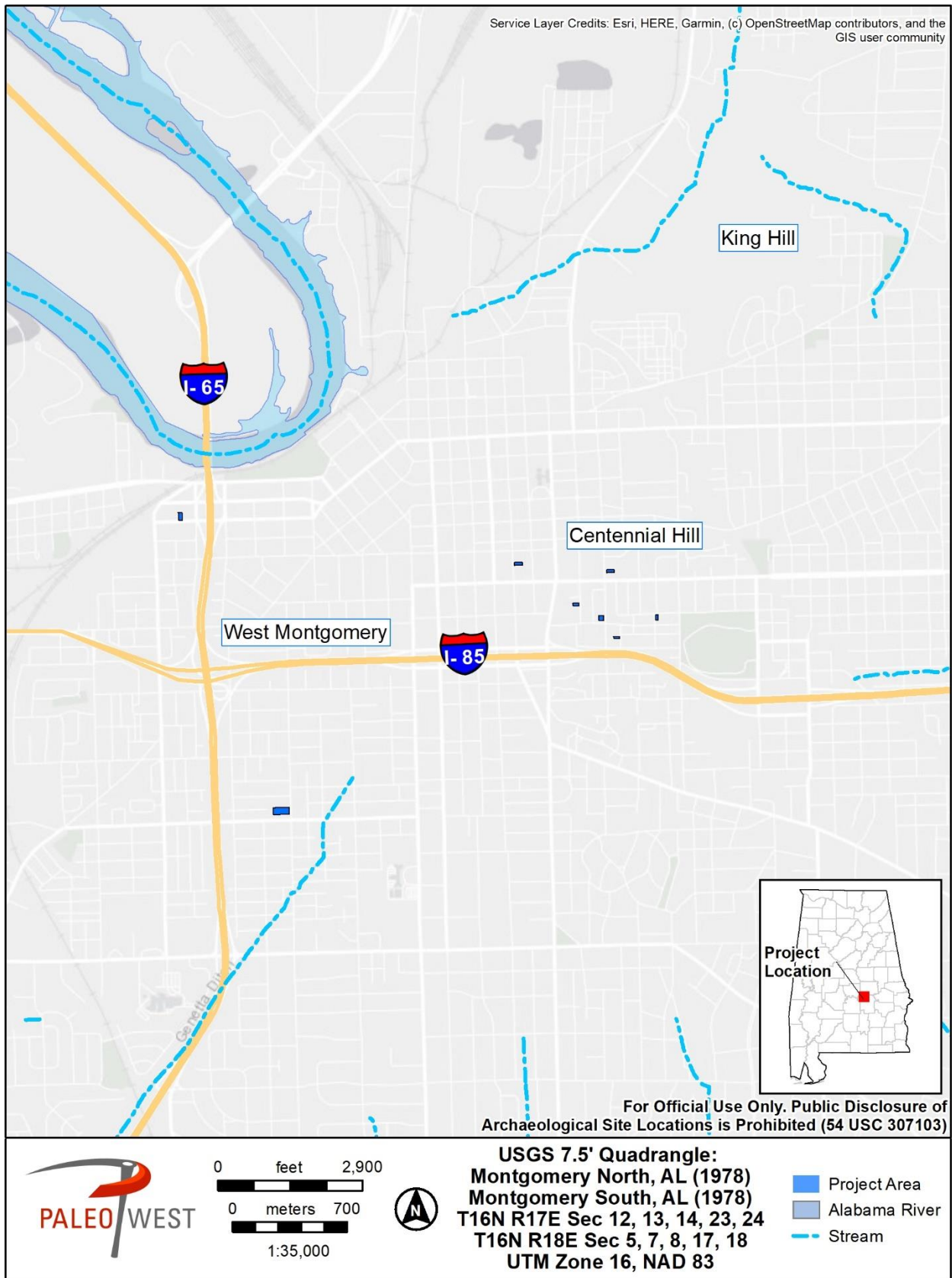


Figure 9. Surveyed buildings constructed by 1870.

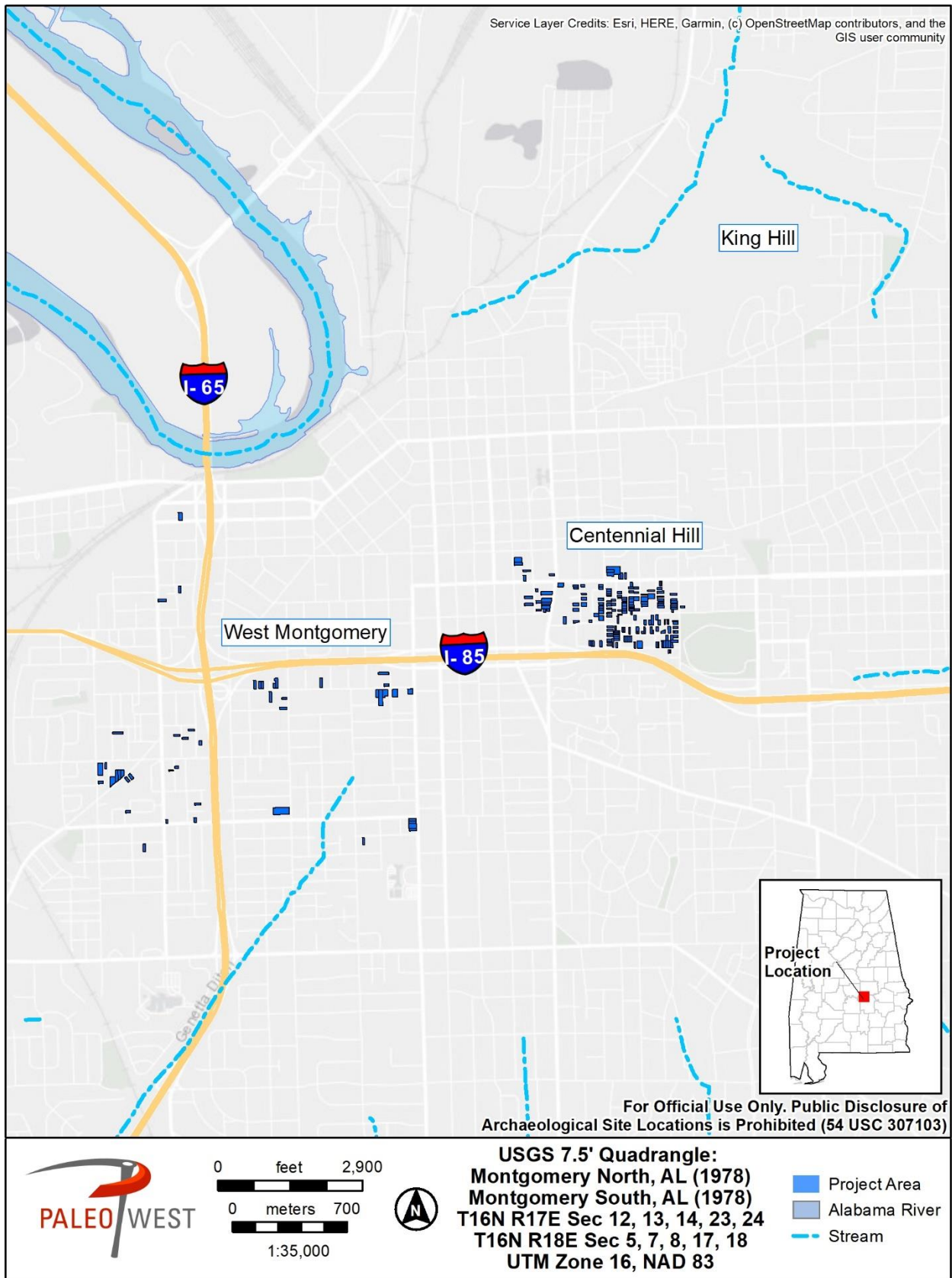


Figure 10. Surveyed buildings constructed by 1900.

Locations of African American communities followed a standard trend because cheap land accessible to them was only available near low-lying areas or areas initially deemed undesirable. This was the case in the King Hill community of North Montgomery. Communities were also established in areas that were familiar to people who spent time in and around Montgomery prior to emancipation. Thus, West Montgomery and the development of Peacock Tract occurred as early as the 1880s. Of the three areas outlined in this survey, Centennial Hill is the oldest and contains most of the oldest homes surveyed. Compare the remaining surveyed community buildings built in 1870 (Figure 9) and those built in 1900 (Figure 10). West Montgomery covers a much larger and more diverse collection of structures, ranging from late nineteenth century to mid-twentieth century and later. King Hill’s structures are almost entirely twentieth century and were built to meet the needs of a growing working-class African American population seeking inexpensive housing.

Centennial Hill

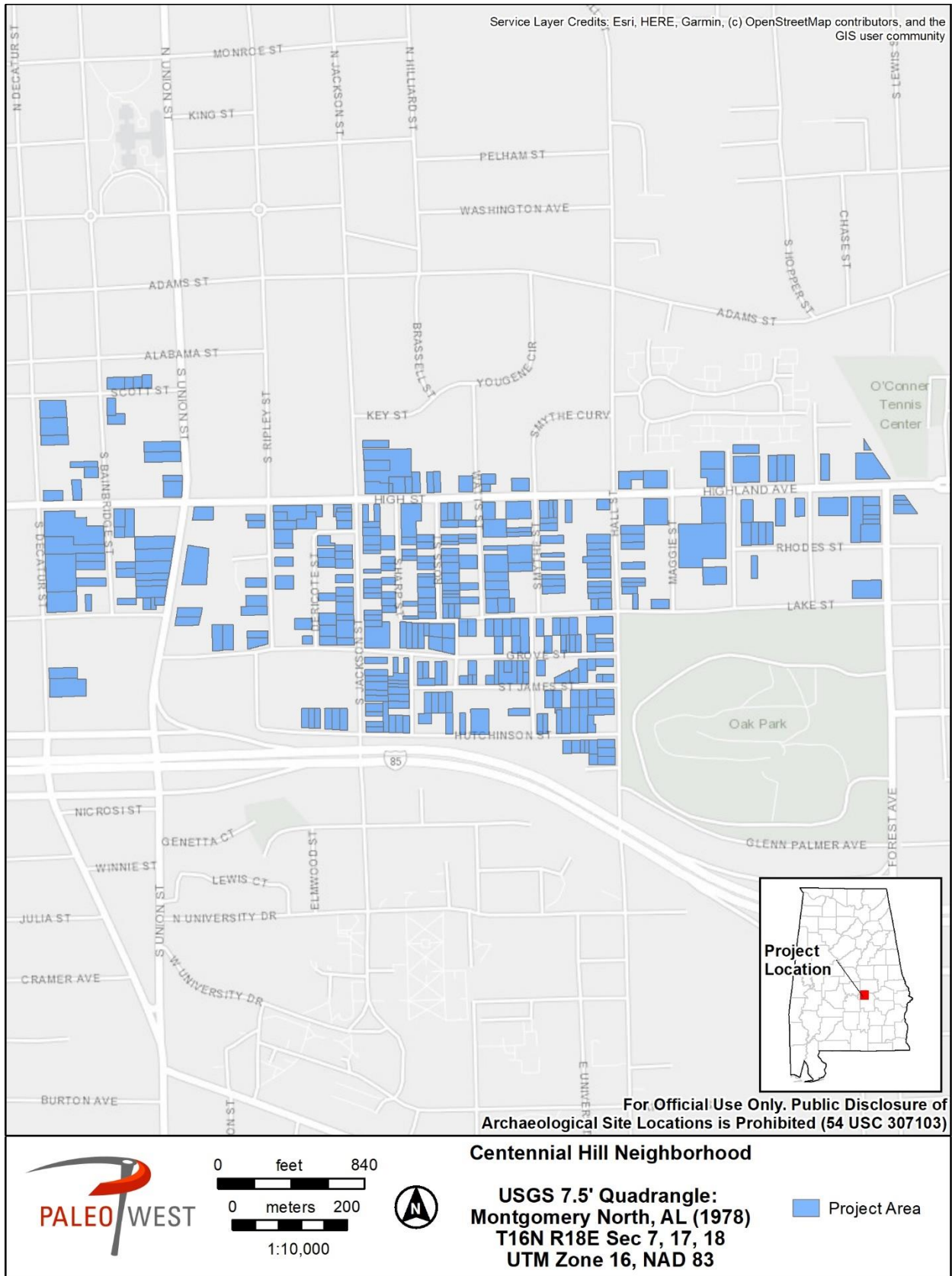


Figure 11. Parcels surveyed in the Centennial Hill Neighborhood.

Centennial Hill represented post-Civil War optimism for African Americans to establish and grow businesses and communities. Southeast of downtown, the neighborhood is adjacent to Oak Park and Alabama State University (Figure 11). The community produced some of Montgomery's most influential African American political, financial, and religious leaders. This successful enclave was not unique to Montgomery but occurred in other urban areas throughout the South. Originally called New Montgomery, the community changed its name to Centennial Hill in recognition of the country's 1876 centennial celebration. Much of what Centennial Hill represented for African American residents of Montgomery and the greater South was an example of Booker T. Washington's model for an ideal African American entrepreneurial spirit of growth (Robinson 1995:vii). Washington had founded the Tuskegee Normal and Industrial Institute in 1881 on the premise that an industrial education in the skilled trades was the avenue for African Americans after Reconstruction to rise from the tortuous cycle of sharecropping and poverty. It was Washington's ideas, especially within Alabama, that served as a model for early settlers and entrepreneurs in and around Centennial Hill.

Centennial Hill's early growth was spawned mostly by educated, out-of-state and out-of-area residents moving into Montgomery County and the city proper to buy land and establish businesses that would serve the resident communities. By 1870, 95 percent of residents in the Centennial Hill area came from out of state. From 1860 to 1870, the area saw phenomenal growth, and residents were able to buy land and establish businesses close to the city center. In 1875, a quarter of the Centennial Hill neighborhood was within the city limits. African American residents living there in many ways were working within the mechanisms of white society, yet simultaneously were navigating the difficulties of Jim Crow ordinances and norms. Only a handful of African Americans served in Alabama's State Legislature during Reconstruction, including John W. Jones, a Centennial Hill resident who moved to Montgomery after the war. Jones opened several businesses near the intersection of High and Jackson Streets. His home was located at 342 South Jackson Street.

It was not until Reconstruction efforts officially ended in Montgomery that early prominent residents made the decision either to move out of Montgomery, since hopes for a “black utopia” had dissolved, or stay within the community and begin to turn inward (Robinson 1995:117–120). This crucial period saw the rise of Centennial Hill’s “builder-class”—the men and women who seized opportunity in the face of external oppression. This movement came in direct response to the city’s limitations on job opportunities for African Americans.

After 1877, residents of Centennial Hill developed, what historian Howard Robinson termed “self-help institutions,” which were designed to serve the African American community rather than fight the external forces of segregation and racism that were taking hold by the 1880s. Spurred by a history of entrepreneurial spirit, Centennial Hill residents spent the last two decades of the nineteenth century building a business backbone within their neighborhood that became an anchor of Montgomery’s larger African American community for decades to come (Robinson 1995:67–70).

Early on, the American Missionary Association and the Freedmen’s Bureau helped to establish the first churches in what would become Centennial Hill. The first meetings were in households and other temporary locations, but by 1872, the Congregational Church was constructed on the corner of Union and High Streets. Soon after, the Methodists established a church on Holcombe Street.

Two of Centennial Hill’s most influential residents were Henry Allen Loveless and Nathan Alexander. Both men subscribed to the idea that development from within the community would ultimately serve the Centennial Hill neighborhood and other African American neighborhoods in Montgomery best. Loveless represented the owner-resident group of the Centennial Hill community. His home was located at 277 South Jackson Street. Loveless was a successful undertaker and reinvested his money back into the community by selling land and renting commercial space to African American Montgomeries. Alexander was Vice President of the Penny Prudential Savings Bank and secured loans to residents in Centennial Hill and other areas of the city. Like Loveless, he also invested directly back into the community by building a drug store at 101 South Court Street and renting other properties. And, like Loveless, he also worked as an undertaker and amassed a sizeable fortune. These examples of financial success were not entirely unique around the turn of the century, but Centennial Hill still existed as an island within Montgomery. Other African American communities did not experience the same economic development, yet many residents of nearby West Montgomery patronized the businesses in Centennial Hill (Figure 26) (Robinson 1995:75–80).

Education was an important component to Centennial Hill’s attraction for many African American migrants to Montgomery. The Swayne School, a private facility built to serve the growing African American population in Montgomery, began in 1866 and was located at Union Street between High and Grove Streets. Another key to Centennial Hill’s continued

growth and development into the twentieth century was the location of the State Normal School for Colored Students, later Alabama State College (now Alabama State University), a historically African American college/university and institutional anchor for the surrounding residential neighborhood. The college played a major role in the development of an educated class of African Americans in Montgomery. In many ways, the neighborhood fed the college, and vice versa, adding an air of exclusivity that did not exist in other African American neighborhoods in Montgomery. Other schools in or around Centennial Hill included the Langridge Academy, of which Nathan Alexander was a member of the Board of Directors.

By the 1950s and the beginning of the Modern Civil Rights Movement, many students and faculty were involved in the planning and implementation of protests. Not only were residents a part of this movement, including the 1955–56 Montgomery Bus Boycott, but many of the local churches within the survey area were involved, including the Dexter Avenue Baptist Church where Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. preached. In addition, within the project area, the Bell Street Baptist Church, Old Ship AME Zion Church, Mount Zion AME Zion Church, Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church, and the Day Street Baptist Church contributed to the movement by providing space for meetings and even helped protestors by providing church vehicles for carpool use.

During the mid-twentieth century, African American visitors to Montgomery were also subject to the city’s institutionalized segregation laws, and many sought refuge in Centennial Hill. As late as 1962, only a handful of hotels were advertised as being friendly to African Americans in the city, including the Ben Moore Hotel, an imposing structure within the Centennial Hill community that offered commercial space, as well as hotelier services (Figure 12). Originally built in 1951, the hotel boasted 28 rooms and became a regular meeting point for Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., Rev. Ralph Abernathy, and other Civil Rights Movement leaders.

King Hill

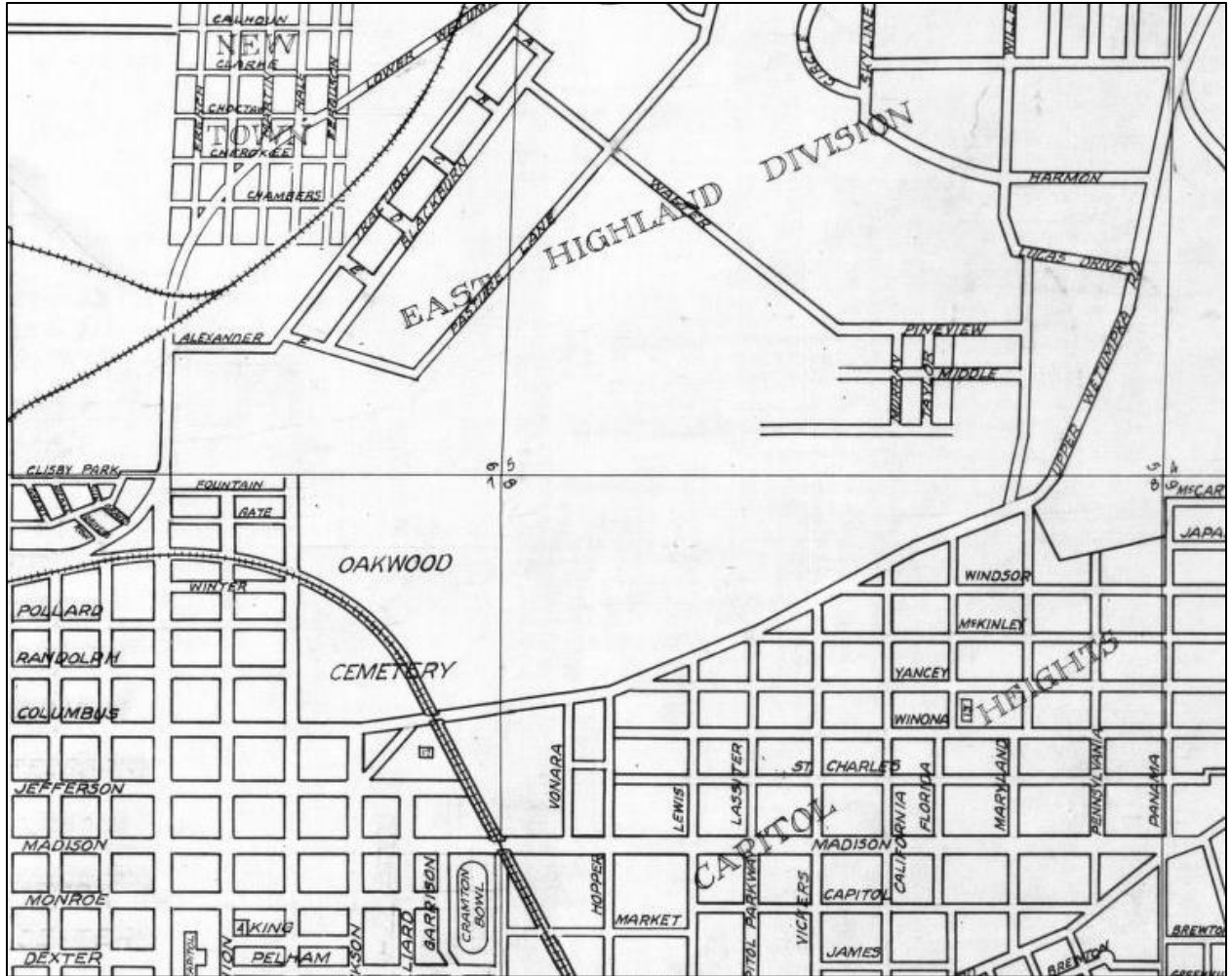


Figure 13. 1927 Map of Montgomery showing the King Hill neighborhood northwest of Upper Wetumpka Road (Office of the City Engineer 1927).

King Hill, like other African American neighborhoods in Montgomery, was created by loosely associated “clusters” and neighborhoods, that coalesced into larger communities connected by businesses, churches, schools, and other community institutions in the twentieth century. It is located north of Upper Wetumpka Road in an area historically characterized by industrial businesses (Figure 13, Figure 15). The construction date of homes in this neighborhood suggests the built environment dates to the early twentieth century (contrast Figure 10 with

Figure 14).

Communities in North Montgomery including Pumpkin Town and New Town were settled before the Civil War by a few freepersons and enslaved peoples (Robinson 1999:5-6) (Figure 16). King Hill was a late addition to North Montgomery communities. The area north of the city's center was bordered by the Cypress Swamp that fed into the Alabama River. The area was low-lying and prone to flooding, which made the area undesirable for many white citizens, thus creating a place for African American residents to live in relative isolation and freedom from white populations.

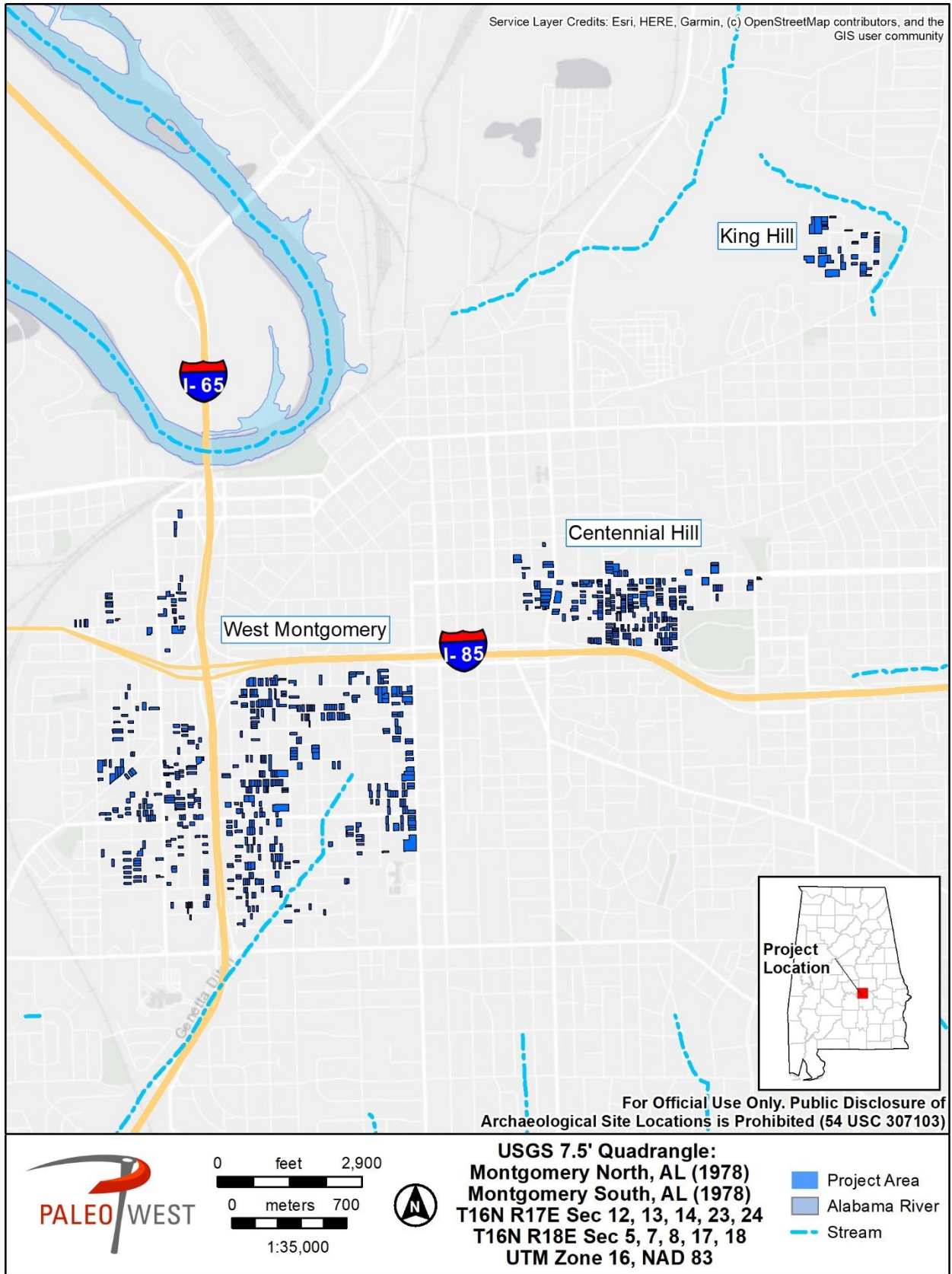


Figure 14. Surveyed buildings constructed by 1930.

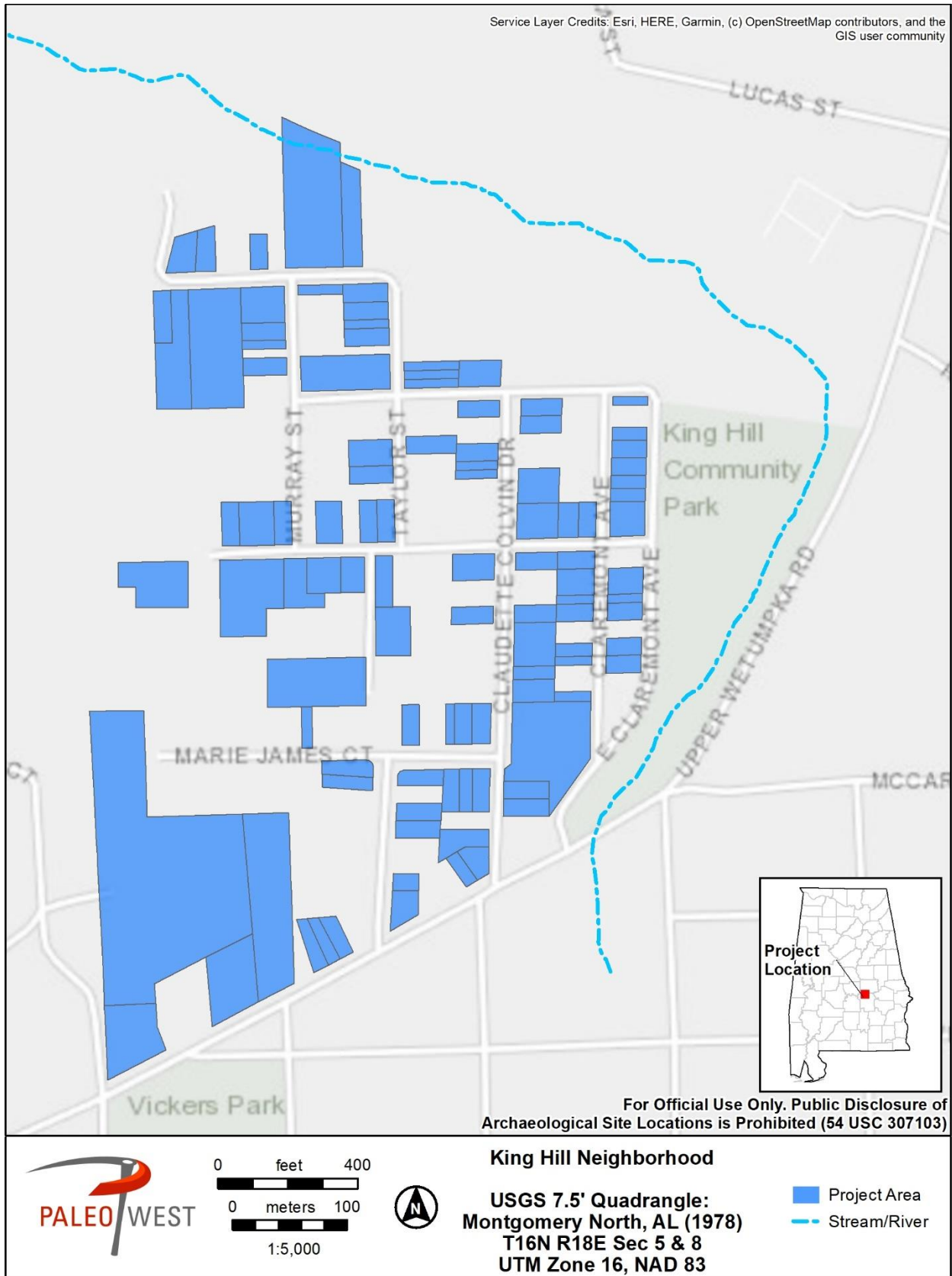


Figure 15. Parcels surveyed in the King Hill neighborhood.

An early settler of the region was Rev. Nathan Ashby, who had changed his name from Nathan Ellis after the Civil War. Ashby purchased his own freedom in 1842 after having been transported to Alabama from Virginia. Working around an Alabama law that barred African Americans from owning land, Ashby purchased property just southwest of King Hill via a white trustee. In 1872, Ashby was officially transferred title to his property. He was the founder and first pastor of the First Baptist Church of Montgomery, located on Columbus Street, later Ripley Street. A subsequent pastor, Andrew Stokes is immortalized in the name Stokes Street in King Hill. Many early King Hill residents attended the second church building, known as the “brick-a-day” church because Stokes had asked the parishioners to bring one brick a day to build the new structure located on the corner of Columbus and Ripley Streets (Boothe 1895).

Bound by industrial development and Cypress Swamp to the east and the Alabama River to the north, King Hill and surrounding North Montgomery served the poorest among the African American community, who had no other residential opportunities (Thompson 1963). For many living in North Montgomery’s neighborhoods, poverty was the rule, not the exception (Robinson 1999:140). According to the 1940 census, African Americans in North Montgomery paid a monthly rental average of only \$6.29 per month. This rent was far less

than the city-wide average of \$19.10 and less than the average for West Montgomery, which was \$11.58 (Robinson 1999:141). This disparity in rental rates indicates that the value of homes in North Montgomery, in comparison to other areas of the city, was much lower.

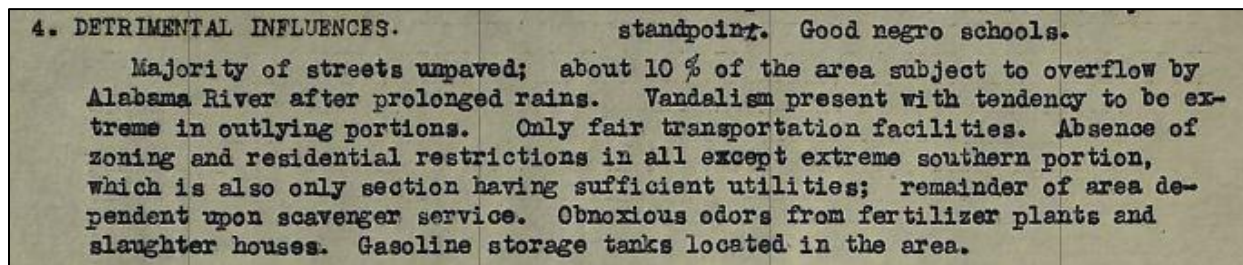


Figure 17. Portion of HOLC mapping and housing report for North Montgomery, including King Hill. Note the "Detrimental Influences" described in the report, including, "obnoxious odors from fertilizer plants and slaughterhouses."

Settlement patterns into King Hill were largely dependent on local industry, through which many of King Hill's residents were employed. The 1940 HOLC report recorded the neighborhood's "Proximity to occupants' employment, such as railroads, manufacturing plants, fertilizer plants, packing and slaughter houses, cotton compresses, lumber yards, and farming, as well as sand and gravel plants and Union Stock Yards." By the twentieth century, some of the main intersecting streets that make up King Hill (Dixie, Stokes, Pineview, Murray, and Fourney) were still unpaved and largely unimproved. Overall infrastructure conditions as summarized in the 1930's HOLC report reveals that King Hill was outside many city zoning restrictions. Access to utility services was almost non-existent in the 1930s in King Hill (Figure 17).

For the first part of the twentieth century, King Hill was a small, mostly residential area of North Montgomery with a large percentage of wage-earning people who worked in the nearby industrial factories (Figure 19). A look at the 1940 U.S. census (listing every person over the age of 14 within the home who was employed) along a portion of Stokes Street highlights this working-class demographic. Occupations listed included bricklayer, day laborer, farmer, laundress, house maid and car loader. Skilled trades were the most lucrative jobs available for African Americans in King Hill, with most heads of households employed in some form of skilled trade.

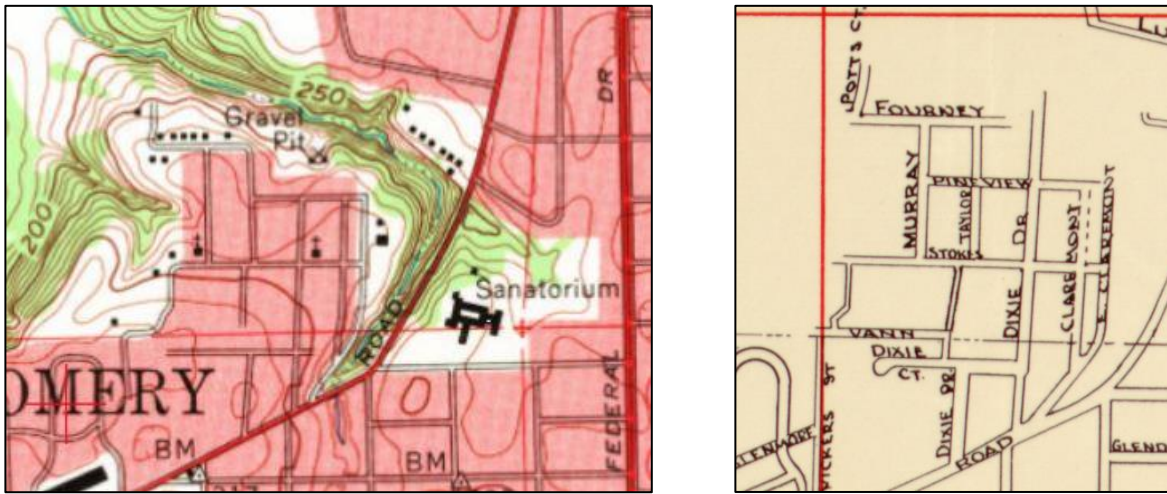


Figure 18. Left: Portion of 1958 USGS 7.5' Quadrangle map for North Montgomery, showing King Hill neighborhood. Note two church structures and 16 mapped permanent structures. The area is just west of the "Sanatorium" and bounded on the north and west by a low-lying cypress swamp and gravel pit. Right: Portion of 1956 City Engineer's map showing King Hill neighborhood. Note portion of Claremont unpaved on northern end.

By 1955, the King Hill neighborhood boasted nearly 200 homes according to the City Directory for that year (Figure 18). These directories are now housed inside the Alabama Department of History and Archives. Many of the residents of King Hill at the time, however, did not respond to inquiries by the directory staff, and thus, their occupations and a detailed list of household members is not known. At the time, the neighborhood was a working-class area, with a large percentage of families renting, rather than owning homes. The lack of

response to surveys from the directory, also suggests that occupants were working during the day.

Nearing the middle of the twentieth century, the residents of King Hill, like other African American residents of Montgomery, were growing tired of the generations-long subjugation, embarrassment, and marginalization. Many residents worked outside of the neighborhood and interacted with residents of other areas of the city for social gatherings and community events. Although residents became involved in the 1955 Bus Boycott, and the 1965 Voting Rights March from Selma to Montgomery, the *Montgomery Advisor* (1961) reported little evidence of protest or racial violence within the neighborhood itself. This is probably due in part to the geographic distance between downtown Montgomery and other, more populated African American areas of Montgomery, including West Montgomery, Centennial Hill, and Washington Park. The population of King Hill, for instance, was much smaller and more insular than other neighborhoods that were contiguous with predominantly white neighborhoods.

West Montgomery

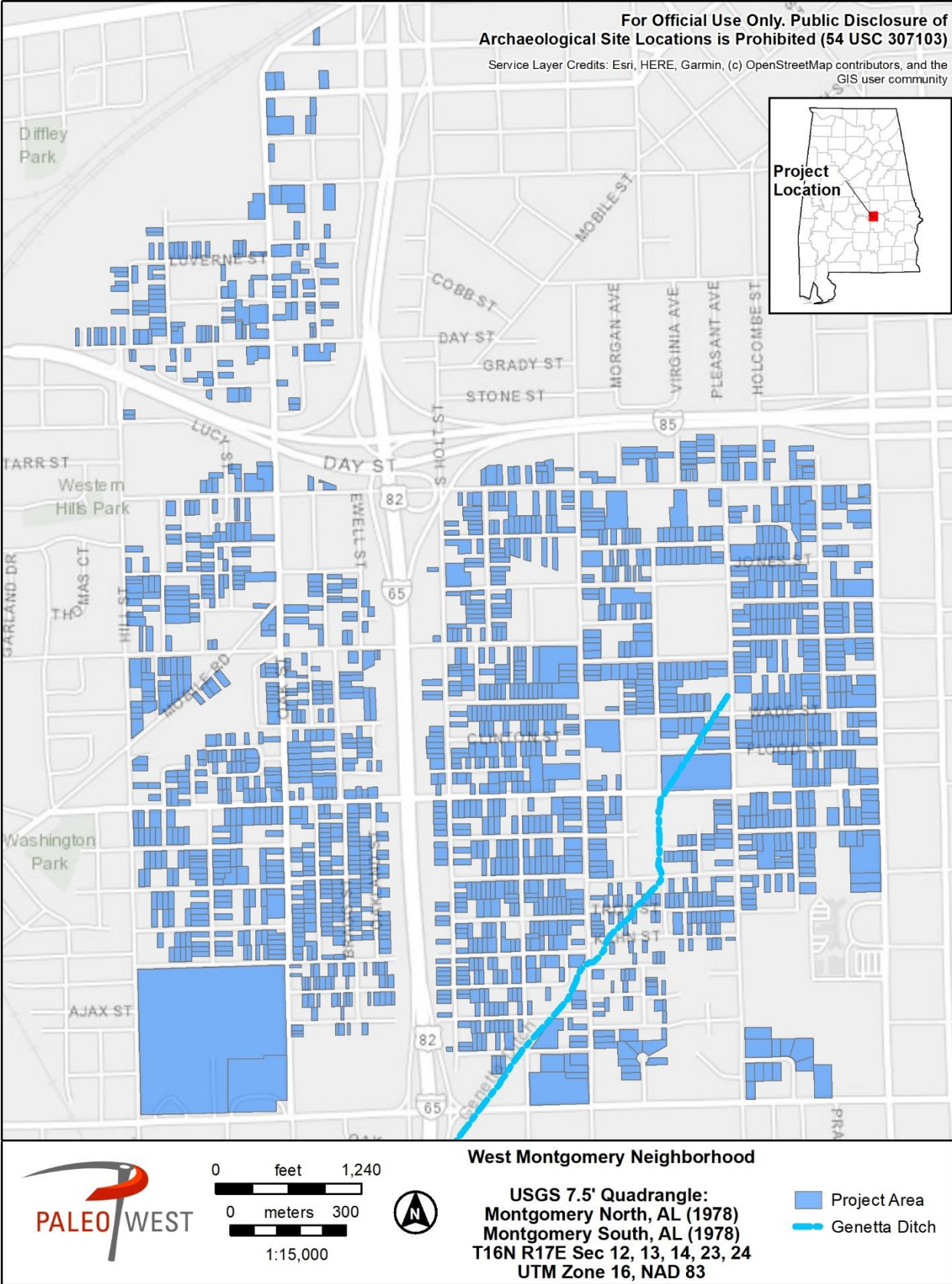


Figure 20. Parcels surveyed in the West Montgomery neighborhood.

In contrast to Centennial Hill and King Hill, the physical definitions and development of West Montgomery, are more complicated. The hub of Montgomery development in the nineteenth century was near the city's center. Small communities began developing on the outskirts, including southwest of the city where the West Montgomery neighborhood grew (Figure 20). The community as a distinctive African American enclave in the 21st century traces its roots to religious gatherings of enslaved persons along a small stream south of the city center, today known as Genneta Ditch.

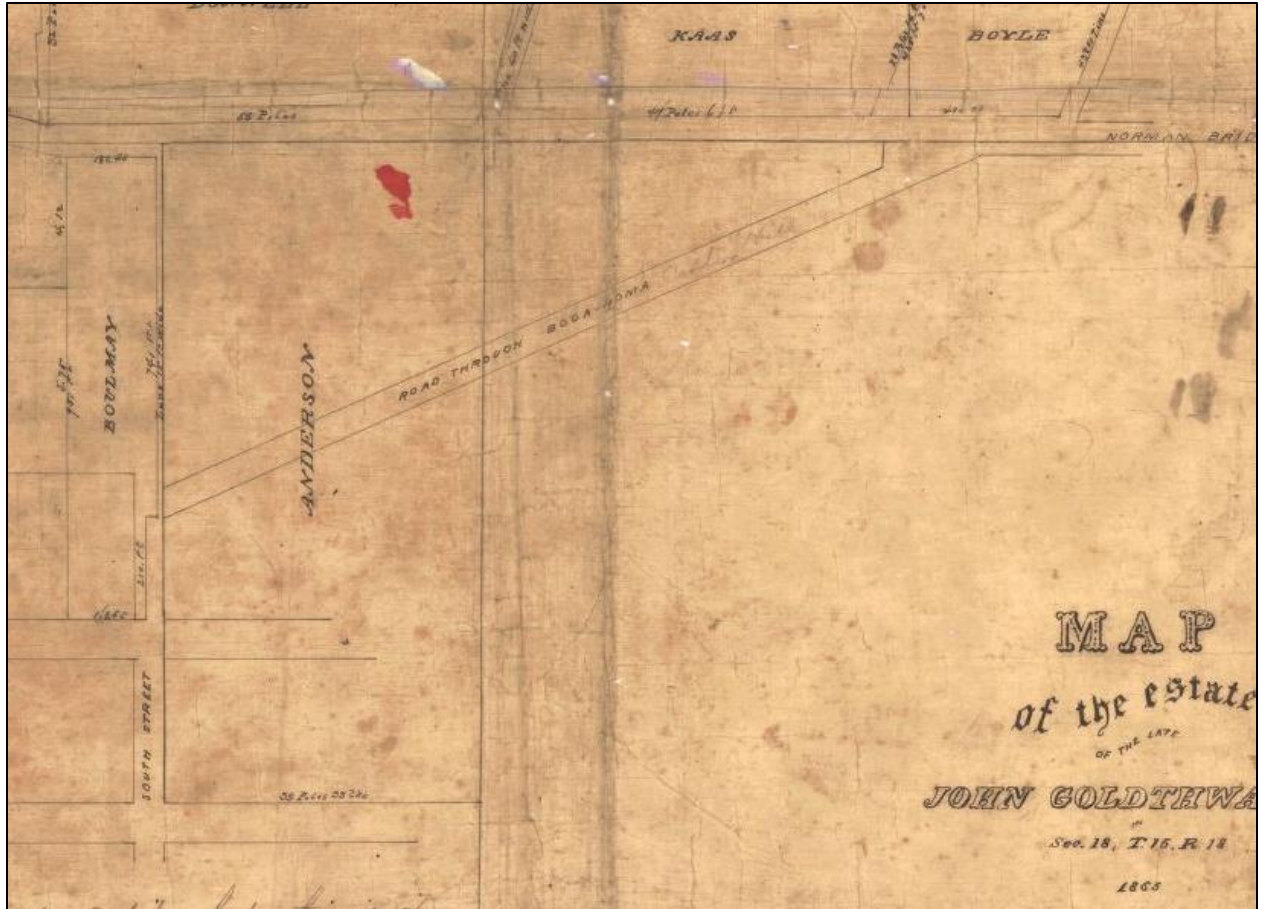


Figure 22. 1867 Map of John Goldthwaite Estate note "ROAD THROUGH BOGA-HOMA" (Barker 1867).

Born in West Montgomery in 1899, Fletcher Hale drew a map in 1960 of his childhood community in South Montgomery circa 1899–1912 (Figure 21). On the map, he notes Genneta Ditch was renamed for an African American woman named Genneta, who purportedly drowned in its waters sometime after the Civil War (Hale 1962). On this same map, he names the same stream Boguehoma Branch. It flows from the northeast alongside the Boguehoma community in the Garden District neighborhood to the West Montgomery Neighborhood. Similarly, an 1867 map of the estate of John Goldthwaite (Barker 1867) labels a “Road Through Boga-Homa,” an otherwise cartographically empty area (Figure 22). Another map drawn by Hale in 1949 representing Montgomery in 1842–1850 places a settlement represented by red triangles labeled Bogue Homa just south of the stream and east of South Decatur Street (Figure 23). It continues to be labeled Boguhoma Branch on the 1900 Sanborn Map. Although the ethnicity of residents over time is not recorded on maps, this documentation indicates the community was present in the area prior to the Civil War and persisted in South Montgomery into the twentieth century when it was recorded as an African American community (Robinson 1999). Hale's earliest representation suggests early temporary housing along this important community stream and in frame houses in the Garden District between West Montgomery and Centennial Hill until at least the 1920s. By the turn of the century, homes were built sporadically along the stream through West Montgomery. These early home sites and places of worship established alongside them would spur the area's development in the 1900s.

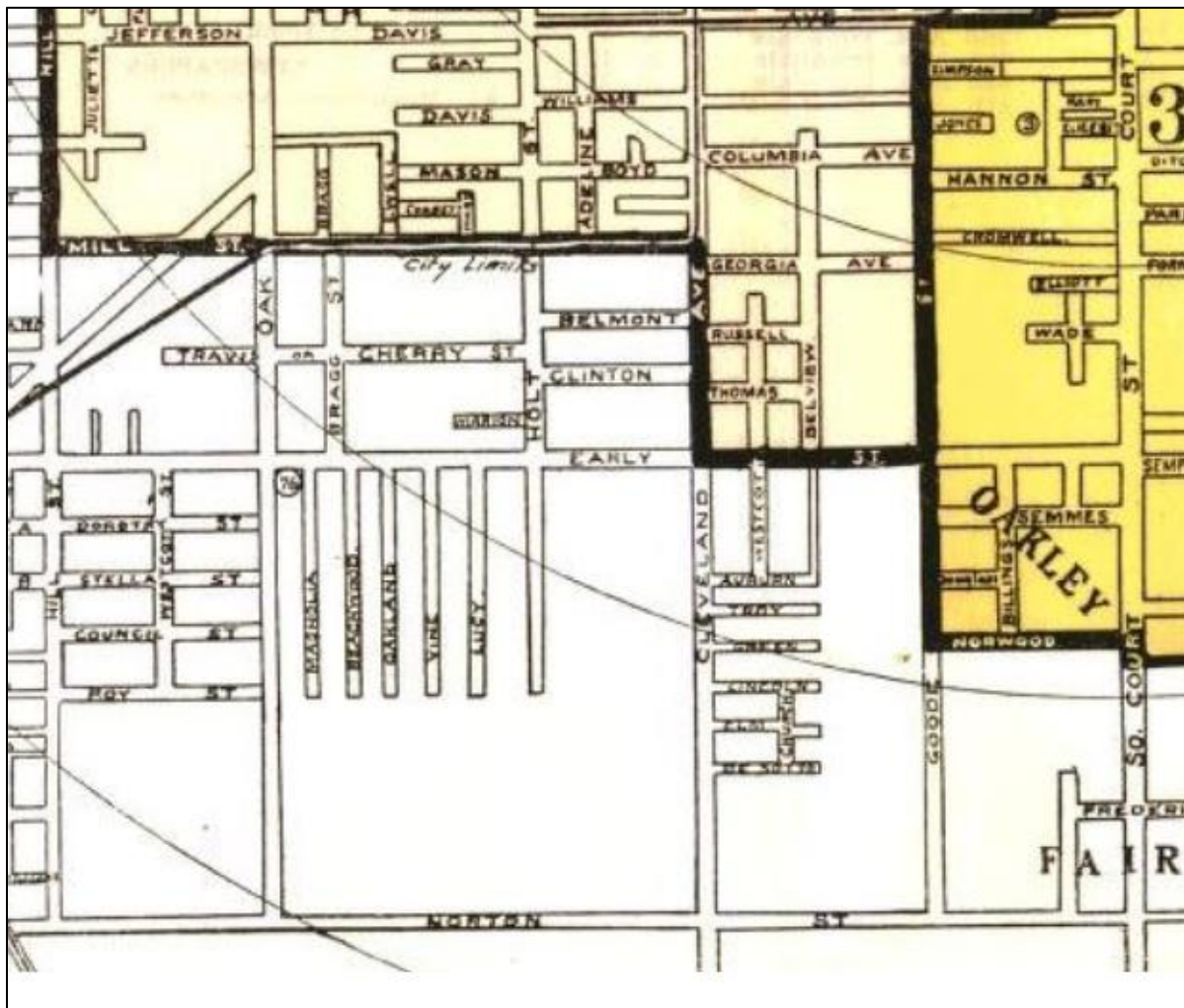


Figure 24. Portion of 1910 City Map showing survey area of West Montgomery. Note the lack of development south of Early Street by this time. Much of the development was farther north towards the original Peacock Tract.

The first platted subdivision in the area was known as Peacock Tract. Later subdivisions included Oakley and Cloverfield. The Peacock Tract covers the northern portion of West Montgomery. Early settlement around what would become Peacock Tract occurred just before the Civil War. An enslaved man named Abram Peacock, along with Abram McGee and Kitt Pollard, established the first church in Peacock Tract near the corner of Holt and Stone Streets, later known as the Mount Zion A.M.E. Zion Church. Other early churches that became anchors for the community were the Old Ship Church and the Day Street Baptist Church. Both of these churches established community clubs and groups, serving West Montgomery's growing population in the twentieth century (Robinson 1999:58). Churches and other community establishments were the anchors that initially attracted residential development in West Montgomery. Much like Centennial Hill, West Montgomery's initial development and settlement pattern was followed by rejuvenation in the years after the Civil War. Homes, businesses, and community centers slowly spread south from the Peacock Tract area, eventually reaching the Fairview Avenue section by the mid-twentieth century (Figure 24). Much of West Montgomery's development centered around major commercial intersections such as South Court Street and West Jeff Davis, and Oak Street and West Jeff Davis farther west. By the 1940s, West Montgomery housed the largest concentration of the city's African American population, with the most of these individuals working as laborers, domestic workers, and railroad workers. The HOLC survey conducted in the late 1930's classified the West Montgomery region (D-6) as "hazardous," and "houses of advanced age show dilapidation," portions subject to vandalism." The survey lists the predominant housing type as "1-story, 4-rm single," "frame construction," with a "slowly increasing" population of nearly 75 percent "Negro." In terms of investment, the HOLC survey for West Montgomery

set the tone for decades of neglect and a lack of financing for housing development and new construction in the area (Nelson et al. 2019).

The City of Montgomery purchased a section of land in West Montgomery and constructed the Washington Park Recreation area, which became one of the only recreation areas available for Montgomery's African American population (Robinson 1999). African Americans were excluded from most public parks and other recreation facilities in the city, a situation that led to further insulation and marginalization. As ostensibly isolated communities for much of the twentieth century, Montgomery's African American neighborhoods had long-established community norms, distinct inter-socioeconomic stratifications, and were tight knit. For Montgomery's African American residents in the mid-twentieth century, the decades of violence, segregation, terror, and lack of opportunity led to several major events that

captured the nation's attention and placed Montgomery at the center of a national dialogue about African American civil rights.

City of St. Jude

The City of St. Jude is a Catholic educational facility and medical center constructed in the 1930s at the southwestern corner of the surveyed area of West Montgomery. Built to serve African American residents of West Montgomery and the broader metropolitan area, a population that largely was barred from using other public medical and educational facilities, the campus helped filled the gap in available public services.

The campus encompasses roughly 40 acres of land on the north side of West Fairview Avenue, within the southwestern limits of the West Montgomery survey area. Founded in 1934 by Father Harold Purcell, City of St. Jude is an institutional campus that was based on the principle of non-discriminatory health services. Its location near Washington Park and West Montgomery meant that a large portion of the facility's patrons were African American. Father Purcell was an ardent supporter of civil rights for African Americans and was also a student of architecture. This is reflected in the unique Romanesque stylings applied to the campus buildings (National Register of Historic Places Nomination Form 1990:4).

During the Depression, social services for Montgomery's African American population were severely lacking. There was only one hospital that exclusively served the community, and any other public facility barred African American patients from entering, even in emergencies. The rate of child-bearing deaths and preventable diseases among the city's African American population was substantially higher than it was for whites, and City of St. Jude sought to fill that void in accessible medical care (National Register of Historic Places Nomination Form 1990:4).

Father Purcell, an early priest who worked to build St. Jude described the neighborhood of West Montgomery as having, "only two paved streets, gravel and clay, mud and dust, never a sidewalk describe these streets." He further describes neighborhood faucets from which people carried water, with no plumbing in many of the houses surrounding the campus.

The entire City of St. Jude campus was listed in the National Register of Historic Places in 1990 for its unique architecture and the role the hospital and other facilities played in the lives of Montgomery's African American population.

The Civil Rights Movement in Montgomery

Montgomery played a major role in the Modern Civil Rights Movement. Decades of violence, segregation, and disenfranchisement moved Montgomery's African American citizens toward action. A series of events occurred in the city that captured national attention and began a cascade of change unlike anything that the city had seen since the Civil War. Both the 1955 Montgomery Bus Boycott and the 1965 Voting Rights Marches from Selma to Montgomery put a spotlight on the national issue of segregation, disenfranchisement, and violence against African American citizens. Montgomery became the lens through which much of the country learned about, discussed, and eventually reacted to the issues facing African American communities throughout the country.

1955–56 Montgomery Bus Boycott

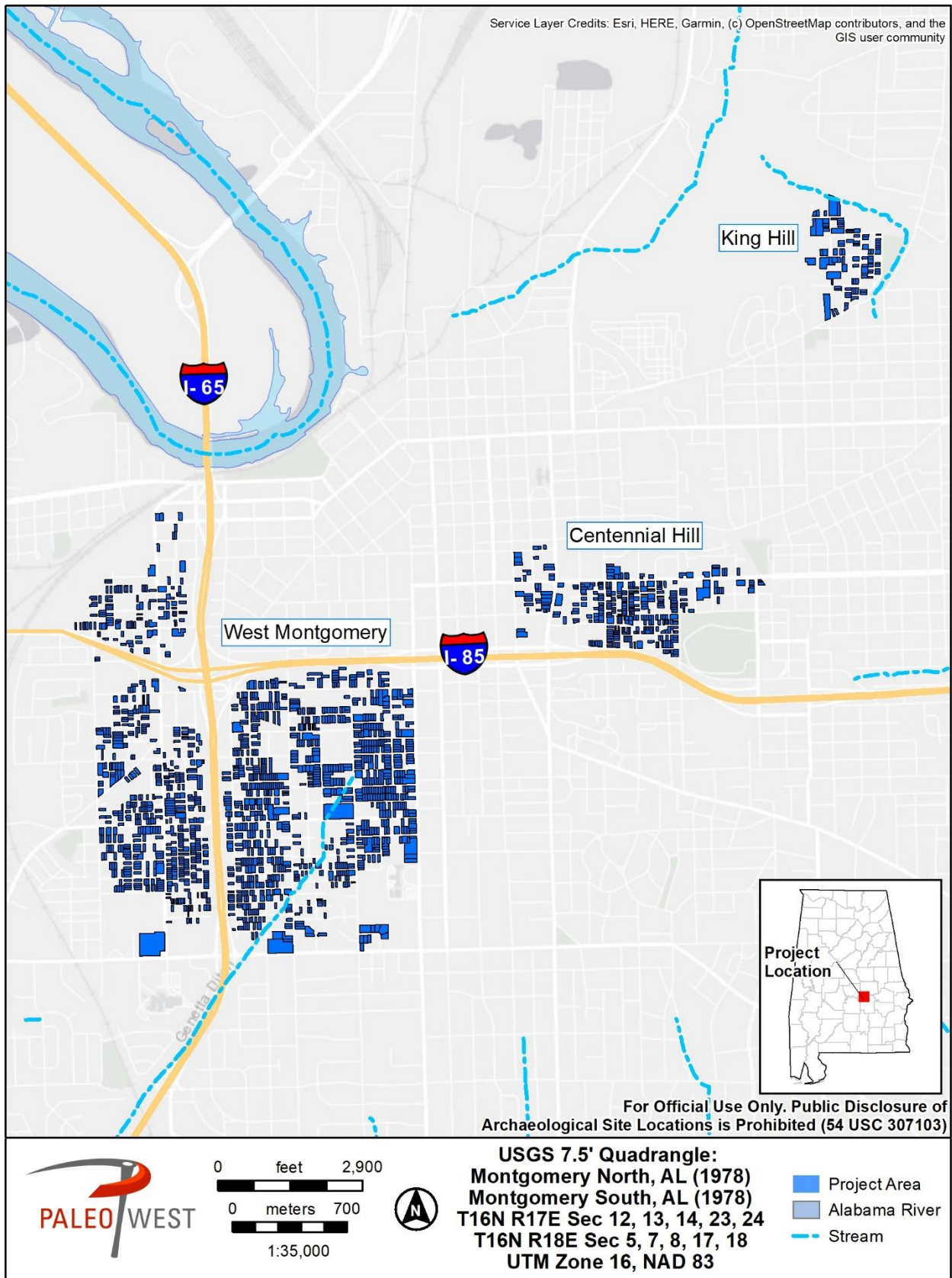


Figure 27. Surveyed buildings constructed by 1950.

The Montgomery Bus Boycott of 1955 was one of the first major events that brought Montgomery's decades of racial violence and terror to the forefront of the national consciousness. A single act sparked a national movement that finally ended in Montgomery a decade later. On the evening of December 1, 1955, Rosa Parks stepped onto a Montgomery City Line bus and, by refusing to give up her seat to a white passenger, began a city-wide bus boycott that lasted more than a year. The 1955 Montgomery Bus Boycott was a nationally significant event, but the people actually dealing with the boycott, and the myriad difficulties it entailed, were the African American citizens of the City of Montgomery. The entire burden of the movement was borne by the African American population of Montgomery. A microscope focused on the city's predominantly African American neighborhoods, including those within the boundaries of this survey. Figure 27 illustrates those buildings within the Centennial Hill, West Montgomery, and King Hill neighborhoods constructed by 1950.

The boycott of 1955–56 was not the first of its kind in the South, or even in Montgomery. Another boycott of the city's public streetcar segregation laws that occurred from 1900 to 1902 resulted in a temporary suspension of segregated seating arrangements, although this was soon overturned by city ordinance (Hampton and Fayer 1990:18). In March 1955 Claudette Colvin, a teenage resident of King Hill, was arrested for refusing to give up her seat on the bus. She lived at 1862 Stokes Street with her mother Sylvia, at the corner of Stokes and Taylor Streets. However, the case was not adopted by the local chapter of NAACP because activists felt her youth and poverty would not make her a sympathetic candidate (Robinson 1999:266). Stirrings of a protest movement against Montgomery's segregation laws had been simmering for years before the bus boycott and the formation of the Montgomery Improvement Association (MIA), the formal organizing wing of the bus boycott that included preachers, and other community leaders. Their role became increasingly important as the boycott dragged on and national and international attention grew. However, what made this particular period significant was the fact that such a high percentage of Montgomery's bus patrons were African American. This meant that a complete boycott of the bus system would have a tremendous economic affect and thus could potentially force change. Very early on, the bus boycott's organizers pushed for a financially burdensome protest for the white population that would produce more success.

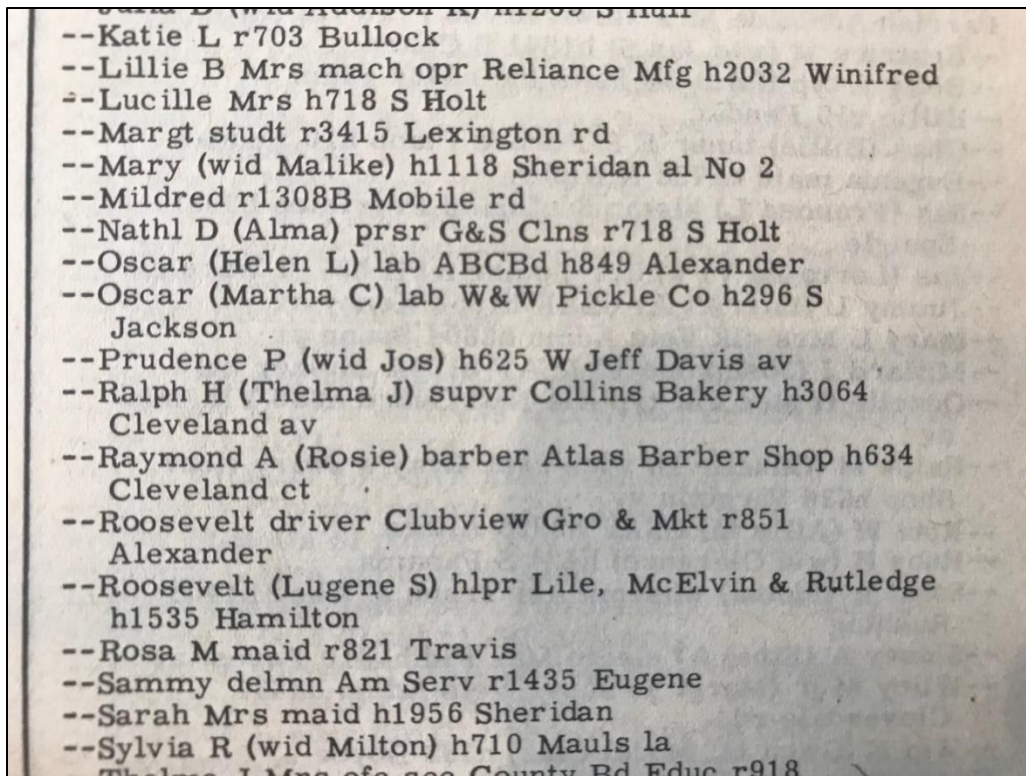


Figure 28. Excerpt from Polk's 1955 Montgomery Directory, showing an entry for "Raymond A (Rosie). (Image courtesy of Alabama Department of Archives and History, City Directories Collection, Montgomery County).

In 1955, Parks lived with her husband and mother in the Court Street Apartments. Her name was listed as "Rosie" in the 1955 Polk City Directory for Montgomery. She had married Montgomery native Raymond Parks, a barber who worked at the Atlas Barber shop (Figure 28). Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. introduced Parks at a rally at the Holt Street Baptist church following her arrest, describing her as, "a fine Christian person, unassuming, and yet there is an integrity and character there. And just because she refused to get up, she was arrested" (Carson 1997:72). The culmination of decades of violence, humiliation, and segregation were manifested in the legal battle of a single Montgomerian. For King, Abernathy, Nixon, and other members of the MIA, Parks was as much a cause for rally as she was a public relations figure for the greater movement. It was Parks who finally galvanized the African American population of Montgomery into action—a action that created an avalanche of national change over the course of the next few decades. The spark for revolution was a coalition of disenfranchised African American residents who lived in the neighborhoods included in this survey.

Parks was not new to civil protest, nor was she unaware entirely of the role she ultimately would play in the movement's beginnings. Her husband Raymond had been involved with the local chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) for some time. She'd been kicked off Montgomery's buses before for refusing to give up her seat or suffer the indignation of being forced to adhere to norms, not accepted by the city's African American population. Yet this incident sparked a tremendous outpour of support and quickly led to an all-out ban on public transportation (Mills 2002). Shortly after Parks' arrest, she was bonded out by well-known African American political organizer and leader, E. D. Nixon. Mr. Nixon had helped form the local chapter of the NAACP in the 1930s, and although his regular employment was that of a Pullman car porter, his involvement in the betterment of Montgomery's African American community connected him to the Parks. Nixon sat down with Rosa, Raymond, and Rosa's mother to discuss the possibility of using Rosa's case to begin the fight against the city's segregation on public transportation laws. Rosa Parks and her family agreed. Nixon made phone calls to coordinate the first meeting with Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. at the Holt Street Baptist Church the following day (Hampton and Fayer 1990:20-21).

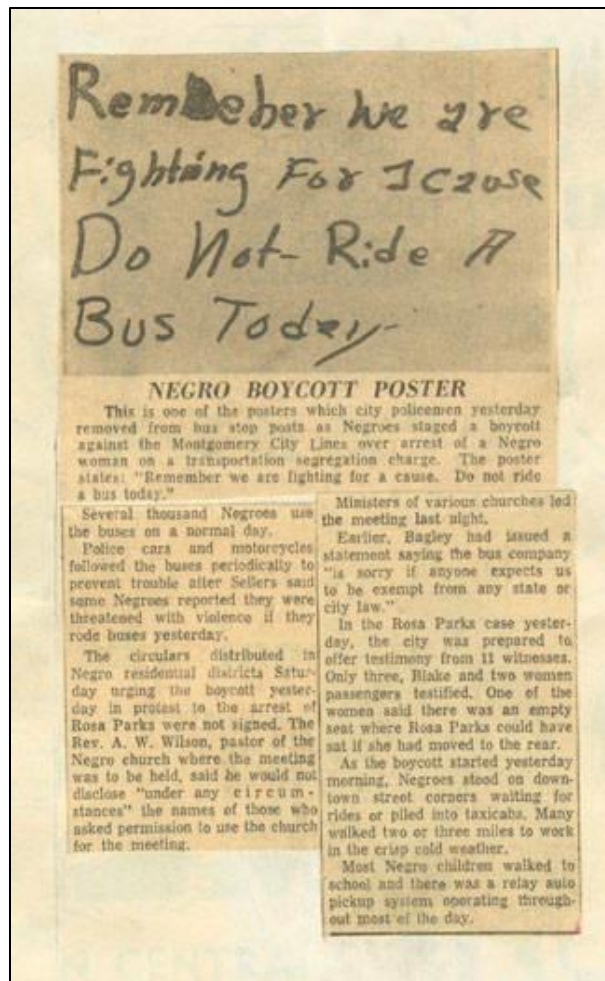


Figure 30. Newspaper photo of handwritten poster and article printed in the Montgomery Advertiser on December 6, 1955. (Image courtesy of Alabama Department of History and Archives, <http://digital.archives.alabama.gov/cdm/singleitem/collection/photo/id/176/rec/1>).

Hand-written notes were posted at bus stops throughout Montgomery's African American neighborhoods. Policeman quickly tore down the hand-made notes, but thousands of these

notes were created overnight by Jo Ann Robinson and members of the Women's Political Council (WPC). Robinson taught English at Alabama State College and was president of the WPC. She lived in Centennial Hill and was not only a patron of the Montgomery City Lines, but also keenly understood the significance of the event. She waited all night on December 4 and into the morning of the 5th to see whether anyone had boarded the buses (Figure 30). She and other members of the WPA and NAACP were pleasantly surprised to see that the citizens had largely avoided the buses. She also attributed their success, ironically, to the presence of police officers following the buses to ensure that African Americans were not being forced with violence to stay off of the buses, as had been reported (Hampton and Fayer 1990:23).

The burden of the boycott fell on the poorest of the African American population—persons employed as maids and cooks who traveled daily to the suburbs to work. Donnie Jones was a 47-year-old mother of six who lived in West Montgomery at 958 Oak Street and worked as a maid at Maxwell AFB. She attended a boycott organizational meeting at Holt Street Baptist Church and, after hearing Dr. King speak, decided to walk rather than take the bus for as long as necessary (Hampton and Fayer 1990:25). For Jones, the boycott came at a breaking point for the African American population of Montgomery. The momentum for the boycott had swept through a community long marginalized by the city's segregation laws and eager for change. The boycott was a tremendously stressful and difficult time in West Montgomery, where residents relied on public transportation more than any other group in the city. Nonetheless, Jones understood a much bigger problem was being confronted—that of systemic racism and institutionalized segregation.

Not only did the boycott place the burden on lower-income African American women in Montgomery, it also exposed a deepening divide between the middle-class and lower-class in African American communities. By the mid-1950s, the automobile was quickly becoming the preferred method of transportation for much of Montgomery's white population and, to a lesser extent, the city's upper middle-class African American population. The burden of the bus boycott meant that, in order for the city's African American population to work in solidarity, the car-owning middle-class needed to participate. This was accomplished through the use of ridesharing and carpooling between members of Montgomery's economically stratified classes. The long shadow of race relations in the city, coupled with a renewed sense of importance on this particular civil protest, brought the city's African American community together (Robinson 1999:274–275).

The boycott was almost immediately successful, and Montgomery's leadership took every step to try to end it. The protest centered on Park's case against the segregation laws, which did not specifically state that an African American person had to give up a seat to a white passenger. The practice had become custom, not law. While the case made its way through the courts, the boycott was draining the Montgomery City Line's finances, as evidenced by its monthly financial reports for February 1956, three months into the boycott (Figure 29).

Although walking became the preferred method for many of the protestors, organizers quickly realized that a motorized transportation supplement would need to be devised to not disrupt their employment. African American business owners organized carpools. African American-owned taxis agreed to provide transportation for the same ten-cent rate charged by the Montgomery City Lines buses. Local community leader and funeral parlor owner Rufus Lewis was appointed chair of the transportation committee. His job was to register when and where a person worked out of town and also register the availability of private vehicles to be offered into a community pool. His team coordinated drivers and passengers to lessen the burden of foot travel. Carpooling began on December 13, and a central transportation hub was set up in downtown Montgomery on African American-owned property. It was here that people could meet up and carpool together to their respective neighborhoods (Robinson 1999:26). Efforts to thwart the carpooling were soon implemented as police issued tickets to drivers for having too many people in a single car or for violating city ordinances regulating taxi services.

African American housekeepers and cooks were such an ingrained part of the social dynamic in white middle- and upper-class homes that calls by the Mayor's office to fire protestors met with stiff resistance. African American women, who performed the majority of cleaning and domestic tasks within white suburban homes traveled great distances from their neighborhoods near the city center, and the transportation interruption caused by the boycott caused concern among the protestors. Yet, as one white Montgomery resident observed, a "play between white women and black women" occurred in which the African American women could not afford to lose their jobs, and the white women would not give up their domestic workers to satiate the city's demands for retribution. White women refused action not out of compassion, but rather out of a sense of fear of upending the social status quo (Robinson 1999:27).

The Montgomery Bus Boycott started with a very localized issue and galvanized a national movement toward equal rights for African Americans. It also thrust many of Montgomery's African American citizens into the national spotlight, including Martin Luther King Jr.

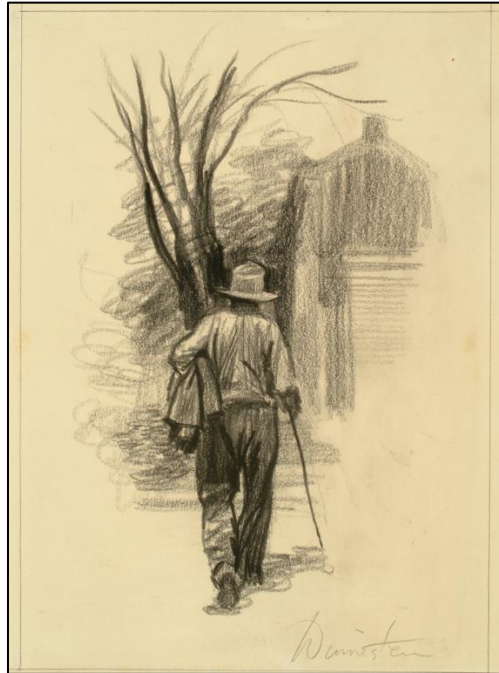


Figure 31. Boycotter (1956) Harvey Dinnerstein, Delaware Art Museum.

Although the successes of the boycott were far-reaching, violence and opposition to integration continued, as did social protest and legal challenges. The goal had moved from local public integration, to more nationally significant issues such as voting rights and the integration of the interstate bus system. Many of the same people involved in the 1955–56 Bus Boycott were instrumental in other events such as the 1965 Voting Rights March from Selma to Montgomery (Figure 31).

The 1965 Selma to Montgomery March

In Alabama and, indeed, in the greater South, African American enfranchisement was seen as the greatest threat to white supremacy. Although a right protected by the U.S. Constitution, for the vast majority of African Americans, local and state laws, coupled with a history of violence at the polls, placed voting out of reach (Figure 25). The 1965 march from Selma to Montgomery was organized as a peaceful protest to the shooting of voting rights activist Deacon Jimmie Lee Jackson and to advocate publicly for full voting rights and protection (Kryn 1989).

The layout of Montgomery's downtown districts, including the state capitol, are such that the historically African American neighborhoods of Centennial Hill, King Hill, and West Montgomery, are relatively close to the city's center. Residents in the West Montgomery and Washington Park areas were particularly affected as thousands of non-violent protestors marched directly through their neighborhoods (Figure 32). National events were brought to their front yards, as protestors marched directly into the heart of Montgomery. This

symbolism of walking through the city's outskirts and pulling the city's citizens into the movement was one main reason the march eventually succeeded.

Beginning in Selma, nearly 56 miles away, the march was thwarted several times before finally being allowed to progress in March, under the protection of federal forces. From Selma, the marchers roughly followed US Route 80, then headed north into downtown Montgomery via Oak Street, which is the eastern border of Washington Park, which lies to the west, and West Montgomery to the east. The marchers set up four campsites for those staying for the duration. The last site was on the campus of City of St. Jude, a Catholic medical center, school, and community center set up in the 1930s to serve Montgomery's historically underserved African American population.

The march through West Montgomery toward the capital left the campus of City of St. Jude on March 25 and made its way north on Oak Street toward the State Capitol on Goat Hill (Figure 33). City of St. Jude allowed many of the marchers who were completing the entire 54-mile journey the opportunity to rest and resupply. A major logistical issue for the Montgomery's March supporters was ensuring the safety of the marchers. This meant protection from counter protestors, the weather, and from fatigue.

The march ultimately was deemed a success because President Lyndon B. Johnson shortly thereafter signed into the law the 1965 Voting Rights Act, which reversed many of Alabama's draconian voting laws and removed barriers for African Americans to again be granted the right to vote. Montgomery again became the center of American racial consciousness as the world observed Dr. King and others walking peacefully through some of Montgomery's poorest African American neighborhoods in pursuit of equal rights guaranteed by the U.S. Constitution. The route from St. Jude up Oak Street and along West Jeff Davis took the marchers into the core of what made the 1955 Bus Boycott a success (Figure 34). The national fight for equal rights passed directly through a portion of the neighborhoods included in this survey. That path to freedom deserves protection and recognition as a nationally significant contributing area to the Modern Civil Rights era, especially as the neighborhoods began to change in the following decades after successful desegregation.

The placement of I-85 and I-65 in African American neighborhoods was intentional. Moreover, the use of interstate and large-scale infrastructure projects to consciously fracture majority African American neighborhoods was not exclusive to Montgomery. Almost every major city in the U.S. including Detroit, Baltimore, Oakland, and many more used federal road projects and other infrastructure programs to physically destroy what were often busy, economically self-sufficient urban landscapes. These actions contributed to a slow breakup of community identity and disruption of African American-owned businesses during a time when there was little or no legal recourse due to disenfranchisement laws and local ordinances. The interstates running through Montgomery gave the city's decision-makers the opportunity to "clean up" the "undesirable" neighborhoods surrounding downtown, with complete disregard for a century-old community that was built on internal self-reliance and resiliency (Miller 2019). There were no African American public representatives at the local and state levels to defend the interests of residents in Centennial Hill and West Montgomery. The interstates effectively halted expansion of Alabama State College to the north.

A contemporary tour through the surveyed neighborhoods reveals a high level of structural degradation for many of the pre-1969 residential structures. There is also a lack of historic African American-owned businesses that once defined neighborhoods such as Centennial Hill. These factors led to a decline in the "black utopia" first envisioned in the late nineteenth century by some of Centennial Hill's founders (Robinson 1995:117-120). Revitalization efforts aimed at chronicling the city's complex relationship with civil rights have centered on the city's downtown urban core, while many surrounding neighborhoods suffer in relative isolation from these initiatives. A fuller understanding of the historic significance and a comprehensive plan to preserve these areas is in progress.

In a May 2018 article that appeared in the *Montgomery Advertiser*, its staff posited that such is the history of Montgomery in a nutshell, a city "teetering on the edge of chaos and destruction, forever the center of the fight for civil rights and teeming with heroic citizens, fantastic stories and a history that in many ways shaped this country" (*Montgomery Advertiser* 2018). The city was born and came of age on the backs of enslaved Africans, and fought to disenfranchise, breakup, and disrupt the lives of African American residents, yet it still stands pushing for equality and preservation of civil rights struggles and successes.

Inventory of Recorded Buildings

Within the surveyed area, 2,255 buildings were documented. Of these, eight were previously listed in the Alabama Register of Landmarks and Heritage (ARLH) or the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP), 824 are newly recorded resources recommended for listing in the ARLH. Eight hundred and twenty-eight buildings are considered contributing resources to a historic district that preserves the built character of the Civil Rights era in Montgomery, Alabama. Buildings altered before 1970 but still retaining a Civil Rights-era appearance was recorded as contributing.

National Register Eligible Resources

Within the survey area, eight buildings were previously recorded on the NRHP. An additional six buildings are recommended as eligible for the NRHP (Table 1).

Recommendations

PaleoWest's work in the Centennial Hill, King Hill, and West Montgomery neighborhoods surveyed approximately 947.8 acres, 2,255 buildings, and 100 demolished buildings. As with any large-scale project, there are several avenues for future work. Recommended future work includes 1) nomination of historic districts, 2) individual resource research followed by local or NRHP listing, 3) fill-in survey work, and 4) public outreach.

The three neighborhoods PaleoWest documented were significant in Civil Rights history of Montgomery, Alabama. A selection of these buildings are eligible individually, while many more contribute to potentially eligible historic districts. Sections of neighborhoods with

buildings recorded in the current survey as contributing to a district reflective of the Civil Rights Era in Montgomery, Alabama should be recorded and nominated as historic districts.

Future work should also include focused research on individual resources that are recommended eligible for the Alabama Register of Landmarks and Heritage or the NRHP. Eligible resources should be nominated. Additionally, buildings recorded with the County property appraiser (Revenue Commissioner of Montgomery County 2020) with a build date of "0" should be reviewed and potentially surveyed. Observations in the field indicate these buildings are often historical in age, and they may contribute to potentially eligible districts.

The Historic Building Survey presented here is only one element of recognizing the community and historic importance of the collective actions of African Americans in Montgomery during the Civil Rights Movement. Future work should be undertaken to share the data collected here with the general public and with the community that lives in these neighborhoods today. One method to reach a wide audience is through the distribution of print media. Production of trifold brochures are attractive and accessible by most individuals. Another method is production of a web-based presentation of data. This format can be both dynamic in presentation and also expandable as more research is conducted within the communities. These communities of Montgomery have many important stories to share. More focused efforts going forward will highlight the stories, individuals, and buildings with interconnected histories. In the future, these can be recognized for their contributions to Alabama and United States history.

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
